CIO Woodworkers Reach Settlement With Shelton Firm

Portland — (U.P.) — The CIO International Woodworkers of America was reported to have reached a settlement with the Simpson Logging company of Shelton, Wash., after a long negotiating session at the Benson hotel here.

Spokesmen for the union said the agreement marked the first successful bargaining session by the union's Northwest negotiating committee with a large employer since the earlier settlement with the Weyerhaeuser Timber company.

Details Not Told

Details of the settlement were not announced but union officials said it may set a pattern for negotiations in the rest of the industry.

Word of the agreement with the Simpson firm raised hopes for an early settlement in the 13-day strike of some 40,000 union members in the Northwest and northern California. The Simpson company had broken away from bargaining sessions with employer groups and negotiated independently with the union.

The Willamette Valley Operators association was scheduled to meet with union representatives here Saturday and another meeting with three employer groups was slated for Wednesday.

Notice of School Election Upon Question of Increasing Tax Levy Over Amount Limited by Section 11, Article XI, State Constitution
Notice is hereby given that an election will be held in School District No. 49 of Jackson County, State of Oregon, from 2:00 P.M. to 8:00 P.M. on May 20, 1952, at Medford Senior High School, in said school district, for the purpose of submitting to the legal voters of said district the question of increasing the tax levy for the fiscal year 1952-1953, over the amount limited by section 11, article XI, of the Constitution of Oregon.
The reasons for increasing such levy are:
1. To meet instruction costs of present and additional teachers, and other employees.
