Widening Started On Dakota Avenue

Workmen for Contractor Everett Denherder yesterday started work on the widening of Dakota avenue from Oakdale avenue to King street, city officials said today.

Denherder is moving equipment for the job from East Main street, where preliminary work on widening the street has been completed.
Contractors have also started paving of Murray street from Plum to Hamilton streets, a project which was carried over by the city from last year because of the inadvisability of starting paving work during winter months.

16 Projects Contracted
The city now has 16 street improvement projects contracted, including 11 which were awarded this year, three carried over from 1951 and the two widening jobs. Approximately 18,035 lineal feet of street is involved.
In addition, another 10 projects will probably be contracted for at the next regular meeting of the city council. Bids have been received on these projects, all of which involve street paving. Engineer's estimates on the 10 projects total an amount in excess of \$100,000.
The city has also received petitions for 25 other street and alley paving jobs. Plans are now being prepared for the projects and they are awaiting contracts.
