Replica Cherokee Village Being Erected in Smokies

Cherokee, N. C.—(U.P.)—In the shadows of the Western Hemisphere's romantic Great Smoky mountains, the descendants of the once-mighty Cherokee nation are painstakingly erecting an exact replica of an ancestral village.

It will be inspected this summer by thousands of visitors from all over the country who will attend the famed historical drama of the tribe's removal to the west.

As did their forebears, the dark-eyed Cherokees will call their village Oconaluftee—By the River. When it is complete it will contain a council house, wigwams and log houses inside the 1600 logs of its palisade.

When they have finished their labor, the Cherokees will continue to stand by silently as they watch audiences, expected to outnumber the total attracted by the other three full-season outdoor dramas in the United States, crowd in to see "Unto These Hills."

A few of them may appear in the cast before the audiences which for the past two seasons have necessitated a permanent standing-room-only sign on the box office.

Last year the tribe's Eastern Band, as the North Carolina remnant is called, saw more than 150,000 people make their way into seats in the natural amphitheater nestled in the side of the Great Smoky mountains.

They came to see the story of a people who invented their own alphabet, set up printing presses and elected a government which sent ambassadors to Washington—only to find themselves living on the site of the first major gold strike in what is now the United States.

Sure Thing Perfected For Capturing Snakes

Matador, Tex.—(U.P.)—Two Matador men have perfected a sure thing for capturing snakes. They have the proof in 79 rattlesnakes so far this year.

Their system is simple. They use a long iron rod, some old rags and a can of gasoline. The soaked rags are set afire and forced into the snake den. The heat and the fumes force the snakes out.

Bill Slover and Homer Starkey killed or captured 68 rattlers from one den on the Gerald Way-bourn ranch 12 miles northeast of Matador. They brought back alive six of the largest rattlers.

Slover and Starkey use a forked stick when they want to capture a rattler alive but generally they kill them on the spot. Rattlers, they say, often kill livestock by their poisonous bites.

Rookie Policeman Rooked Into Aiding in Robbery
Highland Park, Mich.—(U.P.)—A rookie policeman on the local Park force finally reported to his superiors that three veteran patrolmen had taken him along to help rob a warehouse on his first night on duty.

The three pleaded guilty to a robbery charge.

"At first, I just thought they were testing my honesty," the rookie explained.

CIO Woodworkers Session Fails To Reach Settlement

Portland—(U.P.)—Federal conciliators were scheduled to meet with representatives of the CIO Woodworkers union and employers Thursday after one of the largest bargaining sessions to date failed to reach a settlement Wednesday.

The conciliators, George Walker and Bob McClelland, called together the various groups of employers, who have been meeting separately with the union, for one session aimed at getting an agreement to send some 40,000 loggers in the Pacific Northwest and Northern California back to their jobs.

The employers have offered a pay increase of 7 1/2 cents an hour, three more paid holidays, a boost in the night differential and better vacation schedules. But the main obstacle to getting a new contract has been the question of the union's health and welfare program.

While negotiations continued, it was revealed that of the 22 pine mills in southern Oregon and northern California originally affected by the strike, all but seven are now back in operation.
