Realistic Democrats Are Looking Toward Governor Stevenson

Washington—(U.P.)—Some realistically minded Democrats are looking for a presidential candidate stronger than any now in the field. They are looking at Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson of Illinois.

Stevenson has said he is not a candidate, doesn't want to be president, prefers not to live in the White House. His admirers here do not suggest the governor was lying.

But they are convinced he could not refuse his party's presidential nomination and would not absolutely forbid it if the Democratic National convention next July developed a whopping enthusiasm for him. They probably are right about that.

Stevenson is 52 years old. His experience as governor of one of the largest states is a solid political asset.

There has been a whiff of draft-Truman perfume in the air ever since the President announced he would not be a candidate to succeed himself. He has told party leaders since then that he meant it—tipped them not to attempt a draft.

In an emergency the leaders still might try a Truman draft. But a Stevenson draft definitely is the first order of business under consideration by some of the practical individuals who are laying convention plans now. They believe that maneuver would avoid a convention deadlock.

No Reflection Cast
It is no reflection on so young and comparatively inexperienced a man as Sen. Estes Kefauver that some party stalwarts prefer to look elsewhere. Five terms in the House and a first term in the Senate do not add up to the most useful experience preliminary to severe executive responsibility. Kefauver is 48.

But Kefauver is the only Democratic candidate so far to make any general impression on the voters.

Draft-Stevenson talk is touch-

ed with the thought that he would accept more enthusiastically to run against Sen. Robert A. Taft than against Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower. In any event, an effort to draft him seems now to be somewhere between a possibility and a probability.

Jackson County In Sixth Place In MOD Campaign

Jackson county placed sixth among Oregon's 36 counties in raising of funds during the January March of Dimes campaign, according to figures released by Dr. E. T. Hedlund, Portland, state chairman. Hedlund said the 1952 campaign broke all previous records of the 13 years that the campaign for funds for the battle against polio has been conducted in the state. A total of \$26,039.39 was contributed in Jackson county.

More volunteers took part in the raising of more funds than has been gathered in any previous March of Dimes. Hedlund said. He said also that the jump between 1951 and 1952 contributions was the greatest registered for any year over the preceding year.

1951 Previous High
With contributions from all counties finally tabulated, the previous record, made in 1951, was \$512,000.

Estimates made at the New York headquarters of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis indicate that 70,000,000 Americans contributed to the 1952 campaign.

US Battle Casualties Increase 241 in Week

Washington—(U.P.)—The Defense Department has reported that American battle casualties in Korea now total 108,413, an increase of 241 over last week's report.

The figures are based on notification of next of kin from the beginning of the war through last Friday. It normally requires one to three weeks to notify next of kin.

Casualties include 19,096 deaths, 77,025 wounded, 9,720 missing, 1,191 captured, 1,381 previously missing but returned to service.

Higher Price Housing Restrictions May Ease

Washington—(U.P.)—The top government housing official said Wednesday down payment requirements may be eased soon on houses costing more than \$12,000.

The present credit restrictions are more severe on houses costing over that sum than on cheaper ones.

Raymond M. Foley, Housing and Home Finance administrator, said "it is quite possible such changes may be made soon" in Regulation X, which sets a sliding scale of minimum down payments on homes.

GOLD HILL MAN WOUNDED

Gold Hill—Mrs. Maybelle Rains of the Old Stage road received an official telegram Friday that her son, Pfc. Linsley Dotson of the U. S. Marine Corps, was wounded in action in Korea May 6. No details about the nature of his wounds were given. Private Dotson is the grandson of Mrs. George Dorman of Second avenue. He has been in Korea more than a year and was due to be brought home under the rotation plan, bry said Wednesday.

Weed Control Move Under Way in County

Jackson county's weed control campaign is now under way, according to County Agent Earle Jossy.

He said the county rig is now in operation on the road shoulders and on small private acreages wherever needed. He cited three weeds as particularly "hard to control." They are the Russian knapweed, white top and Canadian thistle.

Any property owner with these weeds in abundance may obtain control from the county extension office and its equipment, Jossy added.

The agent added that this area is still free of the poisonous weed, tansy ragwort, which grows profusely in the Willamette valley and several counties in southern Oregon.
