Second Major Break In CIO Lumber Strike

Portland — (U.P.) — The second major break in two days in the strike of CIO Woodworkers against the Pacific Northwest lumber industry was reported Friday when an agreement was reached with two more employer groups.

Plywood Makers Settle
The union and the Willamette Valley Operators association and the Long-Bell Lumber company agreed on a recommended settlement which could send employees back to their jobs.

Hells Canyon Dam Hearings To Resume

Washington — (U.P.) — A House Interior subcommittee will resume hearings June 17 on a bill to authorize Hells Canyon dam on the Idaho-Oregon border, it was announced Friday.

The subcommittee on irrigation and reclamation suspended hearings on the bill last month. The controversial \$356,000,000 dam on the Snake river would be the second highest in the world and would have an electric generating capacity of 900,000 kilowatts.

Thursday, the union reached an agreement with the plywood and door manufacturers which will send about 4,500 men back to work.

The new agreements provide for a 7 1/2-cent hourly wage hike, a two-cent increase in night differential, three additional paid holidays and other items.

Union Backs Down
In the settlement with the two lumber organizations Friday, the union backed down on its demands for an employer-paid health and welfare program and settled for an improved pay check deduction plan. The health and welfare program was not an issue in plywood negotiations.

Willamette valley operators also agreed to a six-cent hourly "hoot-owl" shift differential, according to Max Gardner, business agent of Springfield local 5246 of the union.

Bridges To Insist On Full Report of Incident at Koje

Washington — (U.P.) — Senate Republican Leader Styles Bridges said Friday he will insist that the public get the whole story of the Koje Island prison camp "fiasco."

Informed sources said Army Secretary Frank Pace Jr., is "hopping mad" about the incident and has ordered a full report from the Far East "not in a few weeks or months, but in hours or days."

Pace promised to give the Senate Armed Services Committee a copy of the report as soon as it reaches the Pentagon.

Public Hearings
The New Hampshire Republican said that if there is any delay in receiving it, he will insist that public hearings be held on the capture of Brig. Gen. Francis T. Dodd by Communist prisoners of war, and the concessions made by Brig. Gen. Charles F. Colson for Dodd's release.

Committee sources said Pace's report would not be relayed until a report is received from a board of inquiry which Gen. Mark W. Clark, supreme Allied commander in the Far East, is convening to investigate the incident.

Einstein Assists Girl Stumped on Geometry Problem

Hollywood — (U.P.) — Dr. Albert Einstein, father of the theory of the relativity and the world's greatest mathematician, has come to the aid of a 15-year-old girl stumped by a plane geometry problem.

Details Sent by Letter
Johanna Mankiewicz, baffled by a geometry problem that neither she nor her chums at Westlake school could solve, scribbled a letter giving details of the small fry brain-twister and mailed it off to Einstein at the Institute for Advanced Study at Princeton, N. J.

Back came the answer — or at least a clue to it.

Einstein sent her a diagram sketched on the back of her letter and indicating how to solve the problem. The sketch was signed "A. E."

But Einstein shrewdly omitted the specific answer.

Details Not Clear
"The common external tangent of two tangent circles of radii 8 inches and 2 inches is?" The details of Einstein's diagram were not altogether clear to Johanna, but she decided after conferring with friends that the correct answer must be 8 inches.

She also noted that Einstein had managed to send his reply via air mail with only a three-cent stamp.

Former Ashland Man Earns Service Honor

Dr. Barnard Joy, formerly of Ashland, Thursday was honored by the Department of Agriculture for his services as assistant to the administrator of the agricultural research administration, according to a press dispatch from Washington, D. C., where the ceremony took place.

The award winner is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Albert C. Joy, now living at Harbor. His brother, Richard Joy, resides in Ashland. The press dispatch said his interest in agricultural matters began as a youth in 4-H work, and continued during his years at Oregon State college.
