I listened the other night to Senator Estes Kefauver, campaigning in Oregon. It was an experience I wouldn't have missed for anything.

Kefauver is young. He is charming. He is magnetic. He is "homey." He wasn't wearing his coonskin cap, which I regretted. I grew up among coonskin caps, and they typify a certain kind of person.

He is that kind. He's against sin. He's sure that if we're good we'll be happy. He thinks all people are good but Democrats are a little better. He's against war. He's for peace. Not peace at any price. Just peace. He doesn't mention price. Nor does he mention that down through the centuries peace, when had, along with liberty, has been purchased with the most priceless of all currencies—the blood of men who are willing to do it if need be so that their children may have the precious boon of peace with liberty.

He thinks the employer should have ample profits. The workers should have all the wages they

want. Social security should take care of all the rest of the world's troubles.

LISTENING to him, I could see why he gets so many votes. When he quit talking in his pleasant, sincere, gracious tolerant way, I was nearly ready to dash down to the court house and change my registration so I could vote for him.

Characteristically, I'd forgotten it was TOO LATE to change my registration. That's what happens to you when you listen to the man.

LATER, after the magnetism of his personality wore off, it occurred to me that he hadn't mentioned what he was going to do to bring all these beautiful things about. Peace, virtue and happiness, you know, don't just happen. They have to be MADE to happen.

He hadn't said anything about that.

I KIND of wish I hadn't had that sober, practical second thought. It's so wonderful to feel that God's in His heaven and all's well with the world and no body will ever have to worry again.

Senator Kefauver makes you feel that way. For that reason, don't write him off as a possibility. We all love to be made to feel that way.

SPEAKING of voting, I voted my preference Friday for General Eisenhower because I believe that all things considered he's the best man we can get for our leader in the trying times that lie ahead of us. Since I expressed my preference for Eisenhower, I wanted to vote for delegates to the Republican convention who will stay with him to the last defensible ditch.

There were many lists of such, but I made my own, based, among other things, on the personal reputation and the personal word of men I know. Here's the list:

Howard Belton. He says he'll abide by the primary results. What Howard says, he means.

Zylpha Zell Burns and Leslie (Mrs. Chas. E.) Miller. Men have made such a mess of politics that I'd like to see more women get into it.

U. G. (Dean) Dubach. He tells me he's for Ike and if Oregon voters go for Ike he'll go along to the end. Frank E. (Ned) Fowler. He's a veteran, and we've got to work the vets in.

Bob Elliott, of Medford. He has a screwball ballot slogan: "Re-elect a Republican pledged to vote for the choice of ALL Republicans." How can you vote for the choice of ALL Republicans, I kidded him. He laughed.

"My wife asked me that same question," he said, "and I had to admit I must have been nuts when I wrote it. But I'll stick to the finish for the choice of Oregon Republicans."

Bill McAllister. I know him, too, and trust him. Douglas McKay. Same reason. Gordon Orput and Lamar Toozie.

I'M for Eisenhower, but I respect the opinions of others. If you were for Taft, you should have voted for six delegates-at-large who filed by petition so they could vote for Taft. Blame Placed in Settlement Delay In Oil Dispute

Denver — (U.P.) — The issue of wage re-opening provisions and strikers' "disappointment" at 15-cents an hour pay increase for delaying a general settlement of the nationwide oil strike.

Meanwhile, shortages continued to plague commercial and other forms of civilian aviation although motorists in general were expected to hit the roads for their Sunday drives without much difficulty.

Some airlines continued to announce new cuts in schedules to meet a government order for a reduction by 30 per cent in consumption of aviation gasoline, the supply of which has been hardest hit by the walkout.

A union spokesman said two factors had caused the slowdown in the scores of bargaining sessions at local level across the country, preventing an immediate general windup of the 18-day-old walkout of 90,000 oil workers.

General Disappointment

One, he said, was a feeling of general disappointment on the strikers' part at the 15-cents an hour wage increase ceiling which in turn led them to insist that they be satisfied with "major" details in the new wage contracts. This, the spokesman said, slowed the negotiators in reaching agreements.

A second major factor, the spokesman said, was that a large number of oil companies were insisting on one-year contracts without six-months wage re-opening clauses, and the unions were standing firm on demands that the wage-reopening provisions be included.

For this reason, an official of the CIO Oil Workers International Union said, no agreements "of any consequence" have been reached.

Sen. Kefauver Adds 12 Convention Delegates With Oregon Victory

KEFAUVER—Sen. Estes Kefauver of Tennessee tucked away 12 more convention delegates with an expected easy victory in the Oregon primary over Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson of Illinois and Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas, both of whom were entered without their consent.

HARRIMAN—Mutual Security Director W. Averell Harriman said the Democrats should immediately expand the party's programs during the Roosevelt-Truman administrations.

McMAHON—Sen. Brien McMahon of Connecticut called for an even stronger civil rights program than the party had in 1948, and said he also would fight for inclusion in the 1952 platform of a pledge to change Senate rules to prevent filibusters by Southern Democrats.

DOUGLAS — Sen. Paul H. Douglas of Illinois said he is backing Kefauver "because I believe, of all Democrats, he is the best man to beat any Republican, including General Eisenhower."

REPUBLICANS

EISENHOWER—Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower swamped Gov. Earl Warren of California, Gen. Douglas MacArthur, Sen. Wayne Morse of Oregon, and Harold E. Stassen in the Oregon primary, but was not certain to pick up all that state's 18 convention delegates.

WARREN—The governor conceded to Eisenhower shortly after the polls closed, and said the results "confirm a surmise I have had ever since I entered Oregon to campaign—that the voters of Oregon favor General Eisenhower."

TAFT—Sen. Robert A. Taft

of Ohio had conceded Oregon's 18 delegates to Eisenhower before the primary. He did not enter the race, but got several hundred write-in votes.

4th Marine Division Sets Annual Reunion

Washington — (U.P.) — Veterans of the Fourth Marine Division which fought from the Marshall Islands, through Saipan, Tinian and Iwo Jima, will hold their fifth reunion in San Francisco, July 10, 11 and 12.

Col. Melvin J. Krulwich (USMCR), New York attorney and one of five veterans on Iwo Jima who also fought in the first war at Belleau Wood, is president of the association. Chairman of the reunion is Capt. Louis Ruppel (USMCR), now editor of Collier's.

Headquarters will be at the Marines Memorial club, a 12-story building bought after the war from post exchange profits. This is the first convention to be held on the west coast and a couple of extra features will be a delegation from Hawaii, where the Fourth Marines regrouped after each Pacific assault, and a group of Navajo Indians who served in the Marines as signalmen.

There will be a parade, memorial services, and a banquet with Marine Corps bands from several west coast stations joining forces.

Valentino's Stallion Now Prized Skeleton

Davis, Calif. — (U.P.) — Rudolph Valentino's gray Arabian stallion, Jadaan, is now a prized skeleton.

The skeleton of Jadaan, one of the most photographed Arabian stallions in history, was preserved through the efforts of C. E. Howell, professor of animal husbandry at the University of California college of agriculture here.

Jadaan carried the matinee idol to fame in such motion pictures as "The Son of the Sheik," "Beau Ideal" and "Garden of Allah." When old age claimed the stallion six years ago, Prof. Howell made the necessary arrangements for the future mountings of the skeleton. It now has been completed.

Jadaan, an outstanding parade horse, was ridden by the grand marshal of the 1931 Rose tournament parade at Pasadena. He also was ridden by old-time movie cowboy Ken Maynard.

Four Persons Found Victims of Gunshots

Marion, Ill. — (U.P.) — Four persons, a well-to-do farmer, his wife, their young daughter and an 80-year-old boarder, were shot and killed in bed.

Authorities said the murderer might still be at large.

The bodies of Bryan Cash, 42, his wife, Dimple, 40, their 11-year-old daughter Genevieve, and George Tripp were found Friday on Cash's well-kept 100-acre farm near here.

Dead Since Tuesday
Coroner Sam Simmons said all had been dead since Tuesday.

Mrs. Cash's body, clad only in a slip, was found in her bed. Her husband lay alongside the bed. Both had been shot in the head with a shotgun. It was found nearby.

In a second bedroom lay the body of Genevieve. She also had been shot in the head, but with a .22 rifle. She apparently died instantly in her bed. The bedclothes still covered her.

Tripp's body was in his bed in a third room. He was fully clothed except for his shoes. A .22 rifle was cradled in his left arm, and he had been shot in the mouth.

"It's the most awful crime I ever saw," said Deputy Sheriff Charles Edwards. "I've never seen anything like it."

It appeared at first that the slaying might have been murders and suicide.

Simmons said it was possible that Tripp had killed all three members of the family, then lain down and taken his own life.

However, the lack of any apparent motive which would prompt Tripp to kill the Cash family made officers hesitant to rule out the possibility that a fifth person had committed the slayings and fled.

Willamette River Reaches Flood Stage

Portland — (U.P.) — The Willamette river reached its first flood stage of the year in the Portland area Saturday.

The river, swollen by backwaters of a runoff freshet down the Columbia river, moved over the 18-foot flood stage mark and river forecasters said it would probably be a half-foot over that mark by nightfall.

The Columbia at Vancouver, Wash., has been over 15-foot flood stage there throughout the week.

Potato Acreage Reduction Blamed

Hartford, Conn. — (U.P.) — The state OPS director charged Saturday that farmers deliberately reduced their potato acreage in 1951 in an effort to avoid oversupply and resultant low prices this year.

James E. Kelley said this reduction, in addition to adverse growing conditions last year, is the main reason for the present potato shortage. He denied that the Office of Price Stabilization was responsible for the shortage.
