

### Women's Club Urges Grass Roots Reform Movement

Minneapolis — (U.P.) — Delegates met in closing sessions at the national convention of the General Federation of Women's clubs Saturday after their new president urged a grass roots reform movement guided by the nation's women.

**Assistance Asked**  
Mrs. Oscar A. Ahlgren urged the 800,000 clubwomen in the United States to join her in a campaign to wipe out "Communism, Socialism, government waste, corruption and lethargy."

She called on the clubwomen to follow her in a "rousing campaign of Americanism."

In her address Friday night, Mrs. Ahlgren, who was elected president earlier this week, asked:

"What do we do every spring? We clean house, of course. I invite you to join me for the next two years in a campaign of national housecleaning."

The Whiting, Ind., woman said there was a need to "return to basic values, the old virtues of hard work, integrity in the individual and in government and faith in God."

### Revotes Scheduled In SOC Students' Annual Election

Ashland — The hottest political race in years at Southern Oregon college came to an inconclusive close yesterday, with revotes scheduled in seven of the ten races, according to Dean S. Nichols, Medford, student body president. Only in the contests for first and second vice president and yell leader were clear-cut victories won.

Peter G. Soderlund, Medford, and Ralph W. Wood, Ashland, finished one-two in a close race for the presidency, but neither received clear majorities due to vote distribution between three other candidates. Soderlund polled 130 and Wood 115, while Herbert G. Wing, Medford, received 51, Mary Ellen Yost, Tulelake, 41, and Norman E. Dubbs, Grants Pass, 11.

Keith F. Johnson, Coquille, won the first vice president's seat with 179 votes, defeating Dale M. Smith, Grants Pass, who tallied 163, Robert A. Gouley, North Bend, won a decisive victory in the second vice-presidential race with 204 votes as Max A. Larson, Lakeview, polled 76 and Morris Jiminez, Klamath Falls, 60.

A revote is also scheduled in the race for secretary between Peggy A. McCurley, Jacksonville, who tallied 132 and Carol L. Wikstrom, Medford, with 118, Gloria J. Robinette, San Jose, was eliminated after totalling 83.

Another vote is scheduled in the treasurer's contest between Ronald S. Tiegs, Talent, who polled 166 and Norma Rae John, Roseburg, with 105, James H. Jordan, Grants Pass, tallied 71, Darel J. Verley, Tulelake, won a three-way race for yell leader with 188 votes, James S. Cyphert and Phyllis J. Sabin, both Springfield, polled 78 and 76, respectively.
