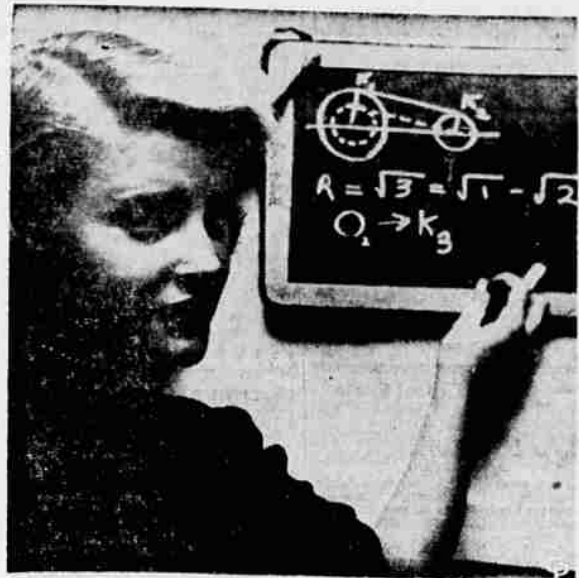

More Than 3,000 Witness 2nd Annual Boy Scout Circus

The 12 acts included the grand entry, precision drill on bicycles, the "Cub Scouts' World," Scout games, Scout Olympics, Noah's ark with Cub scouts acting out a fanciful tale of animals, first aid, clowns, communications, rope and timber which featured a tall tower, derrick and bridge built of raw timber and ropes by scouts from Prospect, camping, the "first" American scouts, Indians, and the concluding number.

The one-time moppet with straight bangs who hoofed in the movies with Wheeler and Woolsey is a grown-up blonde beauty with curly bangs now.

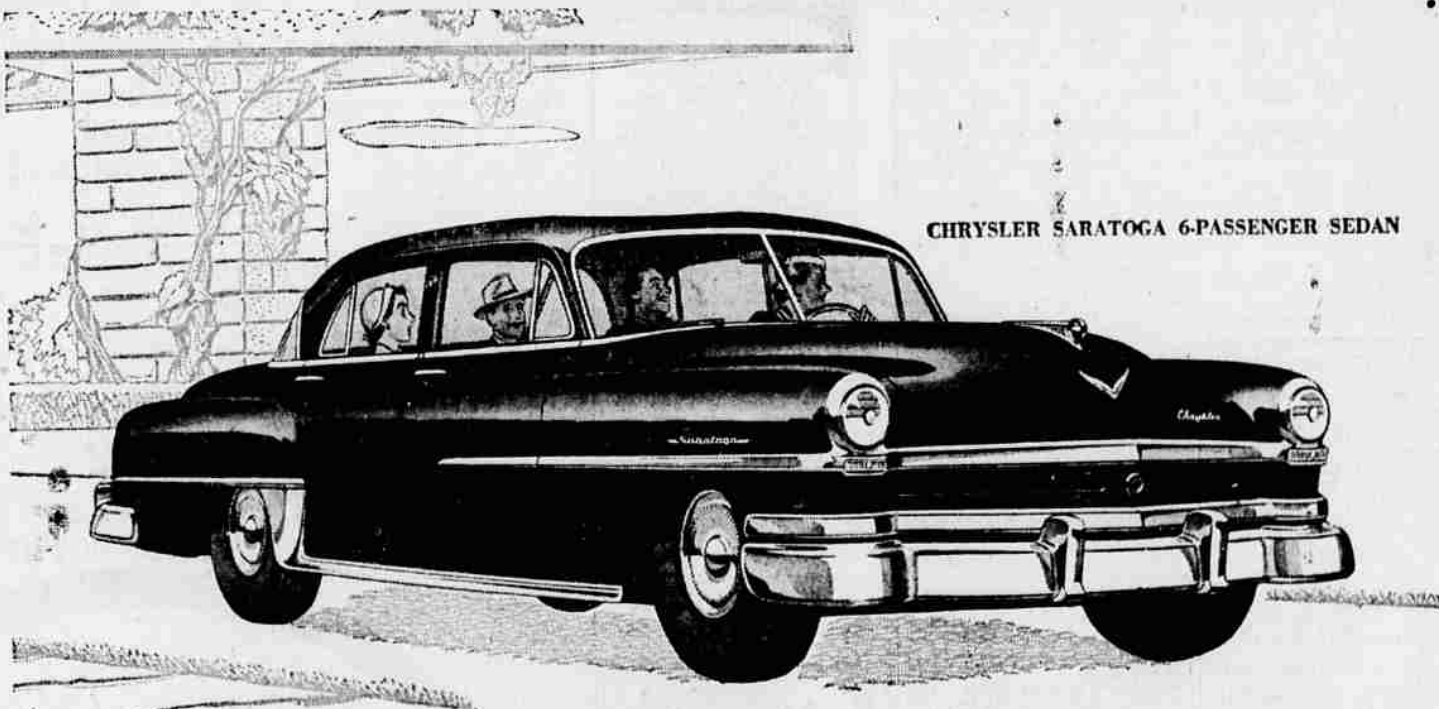
Twentieth Century-Fox lured her over to act in "Bloodhounds of Broadway" because she's not "frightened" of that camera any more.
