Both Sides Blamed In Failure To Up Social Security

Washington (UPI)—Republicans blamed the Democrats and Democrats blamed the Republicans for House rejection of a bill to increase social security benefits by \$3 a month.

The bill got 150 votes for it to 140 in the House count Monday. But it was brought up under a gag-rule procedure requiring a two-thirds majority for passage. The bill lacked 43 votes of getting this majority.

Sleeper Provision Charged
Of the 140 votes cast against the bill, 99 came from Republicans, and 41 from Democrats. The GOP members said they favored the increase in benefits, but accused the Democrats of putting a sleeper provision in the legislation opening the way for "socialized medicine."

Democratic leaders vigorously denied the Republican charge. They contended that socialized medicine was not in any way involved.

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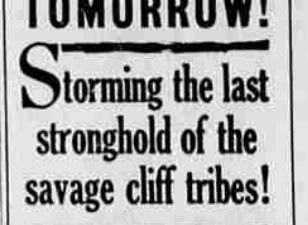
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
