A meeting of logging operators and millmen will be held in connection with the May meeting of the Southern Oregon Conservation and Tree Farm at Grants Pass next Friday, it was announced today.

The meeting will be for the purpose of explaining the new forestry regulations in effect this year, according to L. L. Simpson, secretary-manager of the association. Representatives of the state department of forestry will attend to explain the new rules and to answer questions.

The meeting will be at the Grants Pass Country club, with a social hour at 7 p.m. and dinner at 7:30 p.m. standard time, the announcement said.

Other problems relating to the industry will be explained and discussed, Simpson said, and all loggers and lumbermen are invited to attend, whether members of SOCTFA or not.

Plans also call for electrical power into part of the Evans creek district. The development of these districts has been slowed by the lack of electricity. But this handicap will be removed when Copco's 1952 expansion plans are completed.

Sams Valley soil conservation education committee working with Southern Oregon college has developed considerable interest in the teaching of soil conservation practices in both elementary and secondary schools. Southern Oregon college under leadership of Dr. Seymour Fowler is giving a two weeks workshop on the technique of teaching conservation practices in schools. Lester James, Sams Valley resident and Grange member, is chairman of this committee and suggested that the Grange sponsor a teacher to participate in this workshop. The Grange voted to sponsor Gilbert A. Mack. Several Rogue Valley Granges are planning to sponsor teachers as part of their program to help their communities grow.
