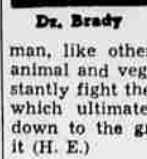

Your Health and Its Care

THE GRAVITY OF THE SITUATION

A reader, past 60, says he is somewhat obese and has an uncomfortable stiffness due to a r h r i t i s (shucks, let's say rheumatism and not kid ourselves that calling it "arthritis" indicates we know anything about the nature of the trouble) and he has a theory that man, like other creatures both animal and vegetable, must constantly fight the force of gravity which ultimately drags us all down to the ground and under it (H. E.)

And thanks to calcium deficiency through the years elderly persons, or at least their center of gravity gets gradually closer to the ground, their stature decreases as their bones become porous, lighter and more fragile. But here I am again oversteering, harping on calcium deficiency, a widely prevalent state in North America, which manifests itself not just in the bones and joints but in the heart and arteries and nerves and teeth and muscles and sinuses and the blood. Most North Americans are serenely unaware of their calcium deficiency because the newer knowledge of nutrition has not yet permeated the mind of the old timer in practice—indeed not one practitioner in twenty gives serious consideration to the concept of calcium deficiency as a factor of common complaints.

The reader says he has tried hanging by the knees over the bar but soon gets dizzy. How long could one hang upside down without overdoing it. Astonishingly enough, he adds that he likes my column.

I should say one may hang by the knees or toes or stand on the head or stand or walk on the hands or lie with hips higher than shoulders or feet higher than head as frequently and as long as one enjoys it, but there is no advantage in doing any of these things if it makes one dizzy.

The man's idea of combating the constant downward drag of gravity is sound and interesting. Certainly gravity has had much to do with the state physicians call ptosis, which means downward displacement, drooping, drooping, falling or sagging of one or more organs or other structures.

Easier for most of us and, I believe, even better than hanging by the knees or standing on the head, is the regular daily practice of taking half a dozen rolls before breakfast or at any time in the day which may be convenient.
