**Truman's Statement Baffles Lawyers**

Washington, (U.P.) — Justice Department lawyers were frankly baffled Tuesday by President Truman's suggestion that the "private power lobby" may have violated the Corrupt Practices act.

The White House offered no explanation of Mr. Truman's remarks in an off-the-cuff speech before the electric consumers conference Monday. He said private power companies have spent millions of dollars on "vicious propaganda" against public power projects, and added: "I think I will ask the attorney general . . . to take a look at this situation and see if the Corrupt Practices Act doesn't apply."
