

# Movie Makers Rejoice Over Supreme Court's Censorship Decision

Washington — (U.P.) — Movie-makers rejoiced over a Supreme Court decision which they said was a long step toward striking "the shackles of censorship from the screen."

The Court reversed Monday a New York state court decision upholding censorship of the film "The Miracle" as "sacrilegious."

The decision overruled a 1915 Supreme Court finding in an Ohio case that movies are merely a form of entertainment and therefore not entitled to constitutional protection.

By specifically striking down censorship on religious grounds, the Court reinforced a doctrine which has been implicit in several of its recent decisions—that the constitutional principle of separation of church and state implies freedom for the expression of irreligious views as well as freedom of worship.

# 16th Annual Boys State Planned By Legionnaires

The 16th annual session of Beaver Boys State will be held at Willamette university in Salem from June 22 to 28 this year, and Medford Post 15 of the American Legion today announced its plans for sponsoring a Medford delegation to the event.

Col. W. H. Paine is chairman of the post's Boy's state committee and Ralph Ettel is assistant chairman. They are now getting in touch with potential sponsors for boys, and are interviewing candidates.

Ettel said that it is expected that at least 25 boys will be sent from here, representing the Medford high school, St. Mary's school, and the Jacksonville and Phoenix schools.

Only boys with outstanding records and qualifications are selected to attend the annual event. Ettel pointed out, and there they receive training in service, leadership and citizenship.

The Boys State program, sponsored throughout the nation by the American Legion, is essentially a program of education. Its purpose is to teach boys of today constructive attitudes toward the American form of government. It attempts to show them that democratic government has not outlived its usefulness, Ettel said, but that a democracy needs an intelligent citizenry and a clean, honest and impartial administration responsive to the will of the people.

# Emmanuel Receives 10-Year Sentence

Chenails—(U.P.)—Samuel Emmanuel, resigned state land board secretary, was sentenced to 10 years imprisonment and fined \$3,500 Monday on three bribery counts.

Lewis county Superior Judge John Murray sentenced Emmanuel to 10 years on each of three counts, to be served at the same time. He was fined \$500 on the first count, \$500 on the second, and \$2,500 on the third.

Emmanuel was convicted on charges of asking and receiving bribes totaling \$6,000 from J. H. England, retired Winlock lumberman, in exchange for extending cutting time on a state timber purchase.

He appealed the conviction to the State Supreme court.
