New Chemical Said Rough on Mice

A means of eradicating field mice, which have menaced the E. P. Vilas orchards, on route 2 in the "Big Sticky" area north-east of Medford, in ever increasing numbers the past few years, was announced this week. The mice each recent year have girdled and killed more and more trees and commonly used rodent control measures had little or no effect, according to the Vilas.

Results Good
Vilas said the results on his place were good.

Recently Ed Geary, operator of one of a bent grass ranch in Klamath county, visited the Vilas orchards and suggested the operators use a newer type of poison now being used in the mid- and southwestern states. Geary had dusted his holdings, some 4,000 to 5,000 acres with

the poison, and in two days' time had killed "every mouse on the ranch," something he had been unable to do with the use of other rodent eradicators.

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Earl Jossy, county extension agent, said today that tests made with the new compound on a small scale were inconclusive, but that from all indications, where it has been used in large scale operations and where operators could afford to do so, it is effective, Jossy said. The content of the poison mixture is the same as some of the newer insecticides now being used with good results for lygus, which attacks

legumes, spoiling the seeds, and for cut worms.
