Fire Weather Survey Cooperation Reported

A cooperative fire weather survey program between the state forest patrol and Medford Corporation got underway here yesterday, according to Ted Maul, district warden.

Under the program, Maul said, Medco will furnish readings of fuel moisture, relative humidity, wind velocity and precipitation for the Butte Falls area. The firm is the first private area in District 16, including Jackson, Josephine and part of Douglas counties, to take part in such a program, he said.

Data compiled by Medco, along with other information collected in District 16, will be forwarded to state headquarters in Salem, where it will be computed and used as a basis for determining the necessity of forest closures in this area, Maul said.
