

Council Approves Alley Paving Over Minority Protest

The Medford city council last night backed up a two to one majority of property owners in the area involved by voting to pave an alley running between Dakota avenue and 14th street from Newtown to King streets.

The council's 5 to 1 vote for paving overrode strong written and verbal protests of three property owners who stated the cost involved was too high for the benefit derived. They also pointed out that because of the "good condition" of their end of the alley, paving would not help them.

Councilman Elmer Childers voted no and Councilmen John Spider and Stanley Jones Jr., were absent.

The council also approved a two-year franchise for Southern Pacific railroad switching and siding tracks on Evergreen, 10th, 11th and 12th streets. Southern Pacific had requested a 10-year franchise extension.

Councilman Dwight Houghton, speaking for the airport committee, told the council that the Civil Aeronautics administration has indicated it desires to renew a lease on property now being used by the CAA at the municipal airport. The council authorized preparation of a letter of acknowledgement for the signature of Mayor D. L. Flynn.

The appointment of Ruth Holmes Boyd as deputy city treasurer was approved by the council.

UN Truce Negotiators Demand Account of Nearly 1000 Prisoners

Pannunjon, Korea — (U.P.) — Allied truce negotiators demanded an immediate accounting Wednesday of nearly 1,000 United Nations soldiers captured by the Communists but never reported in prisoner lists.

Demand Made in Note
The demand was made in a note from Maj. Gen. William K. Harrison, senior Allied delegate, to his Communist counterpart, North Korean Gen. Nam Il.

With the note was a list of an additional 91 American and British Commonwealth troops the Allies believe were captured by the Communists but whose names have not appeared on any prisoner of war list.

The 91 names brought the total of unaccounted prisoners to 986.

"We request such an accounting without further delay," Harrison's note said.

Brig. Gen. William P. Nuckolls, said it had been decided not to release the names of the 91 men because the U. N. Command "does not wish to raise false

75 Chinese Trapped Along River Bank

Seoul, Korea — (U.P.) — American tank gunners caught 75 Chinese soldiers on a bank of the Imjin river Wednesday and killed or wounded at least 30 of them.

Forward observers on the Western Front had sighted the Chinese in the river area. Blistering fire from the tanks cut down almost half of them before they could take cover.

Allied artillery broke up fuel attacks elsewhere in the western sector and along the eastern end of the 155-mile battlefront.

Pendleton Man Dies In Cave-In of Well

Pendleton—(U.P.)—A well cave-in claimed the life of Robert Farwell, 34, Monday.

A carpenter working on a nearby house discovered the cave-in. He saw Farwell's car parked on the road and Farwell's crutch on the ground at the top of the well. State police and neighbors recovered the body two hours after the cave-in. Farwell is survived by a widow and four children.

The House had approved \$1,276,000,000 for the same programs. The conference committee will have to work out a compromise.

35,000 Pamphlets Describing Valley Now Distributed

A total of 35,000 pamphlets describing Medford and the Rogue valley are being distributed to hotels, motels, restaurants and retail establishments in this area, it was reported today by the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce.

The folders list some of the scenic side-trips that can be taken by visitors to the valley, as well as events occurring in Jackson county this year. Trips listed include Prescott park, Jacksonville, TouVelle park, Lithia park, a drive along Old Military road offering a view of the valley, House of Mystery, Crater and Diamond lake and Lake O' the Woods.

Events recommended by the chamber are the Ashland Shakespearean festival, the Jacksonville Gold Rush jubilee, the Rogue River roundup, Shrine Bowl football game, professional and amateur theater, Medford high school football, skiing, and speedboat racing on Emigrant lake.

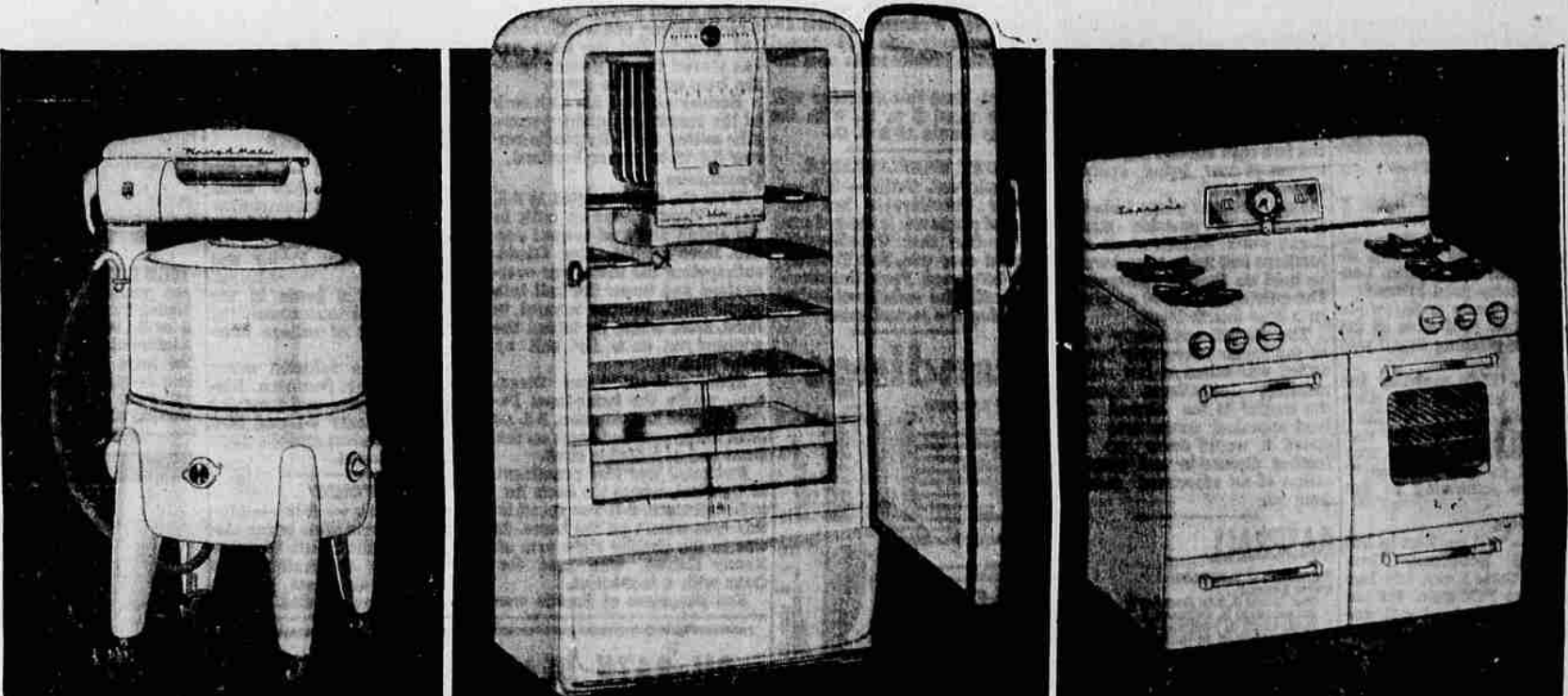

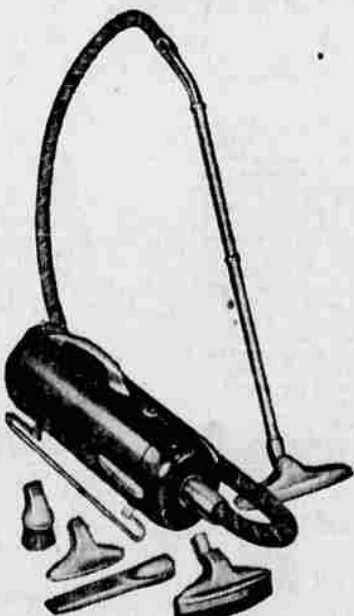

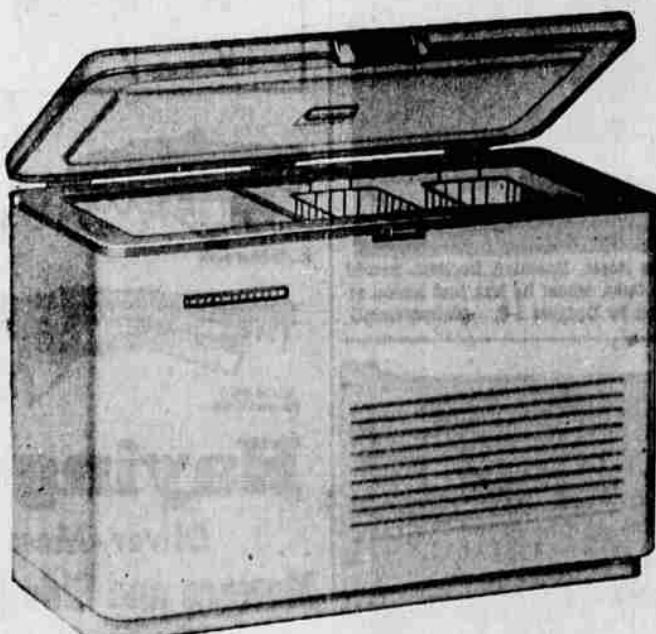
