

Victoria, B. C. — (U.P.) — The 10,000-ton passenger-cargo vessel "Aorangi" smashed into a concrete dock Saturday, opening a hole below the waterline, but company officials said damage did not appear to be serious. The Canadian-Australasian line vessel was en route from the Antipodes with about 50 passengers and a cargo of wool and tinned pineapple. No one was reported hurt in the mishap.

Hidden Spending Attacked by Aiken

Washington — (U.P.) — Sen. George D. Aiken pledged a continuing fight Saturday to bring "hidden spending" by government agencies "out into the open."

The Vermont Republican won the opening round Friday night by getting the Senate to label as a direct appropriation the \$109,301,134 granted to the Commodity Credit Corp. to pay losses in supporting farm prices. Previously, the price support funds had been listed as "borrowing authority," a form of blank check granted by Congress.

The funds were included in a \$840,704,604 agriculture appropriations bill approved by the Senate after beating back several economy efforts. The big economy wrangle was over an unsuccessful drive to cut \$1,000,000,000 a year from soil conservation payments to farmers. The measure was sent to a House-Senate Conference Committee carrying \$116,118,905 more than the \$724,585,699 approved by the House for the Agriculture Department.
