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mented was the late showman Sid Grauman's.

"I had just cemented the sidewalk when Grauman said he wished he could have gotten his father's footprints in the cement. His father had just died," said Klossner.

"I suggested he put his own in. I'd seen that done on a store sidewalk in Omaha. He was so delighted he called Douglas Fairbanks, Mary Pickford and Norma Talmadge to write their names on the curbing with a nail. Then he decided to put stars' footprints in the forecourt."

**Special Jobs**

Klossner had to imprint Joe E. Brown's mouth four times before he got the right impression. The cementer decorated Susan Hayward's footprints with gold dust. Once hecklers tossed eggs into Victor McLagen's wet cement, and you still can see the damage.

Klossner takes three hours to prepare his cement. He arrives for each footprinting event in a

flowing smock and artist's beret, and beams at the newsreel photographers.

"I don't cater to them stars," said Klossner, dancing a jig atop the footprints. "Some are nice, but most got their noses in the air."
