### Ed Urness Signs With Red Sox

The Dalles, Ore.—(U.P.)—Eddie Urness, The Dalles high school pitching ace, was a member of the Boston Red Sox organization Monday after reconsidering his earlier rebuff of eager major league scouts and signing a contract with the Sox Sunday.

Urness, who said Saturday he was turning down major league offers in favor of a college education, became the second Oregon high school youth to sign with Boston for a fabulous amount.

Jerry Zimmerman, Milwaukee, Ore., prep star, was contracted to the Boston club Friday for a sum believed to be in excess of \$65,000. The figure that changed Urness' mind was not revealed but there were reports it was even higher than that given Zimmerman, possibly \$85,000.

Mann, 19, appeared against Sacramento Sunday as a pinch-hitter and blasted out a double to score two runs.

He left Oregon State at the end of winter term because of scholastic difficulties and was attending Portland State attempting to bring up his grades so he could return to OSC. Mann, a negro, is from Oakland.
