New York—(U.P.)—Stocks advanced for the fourth consecutive session Monday on reduced volume. The reduction in trading reflected caution following three sharp gains that carried the rails to a new high for more than 21 years and the industrials to a new top since last March 31. Industrials were strong Monday and the rails registered a small net gain. Oil shares were prominent on the upturn. Their gains ranged to 5 points in such a high-priced issue as Superior Oil of California. Dow Jones closing stock averages: 30 industrials 269.15 up 1.12; 20 railroads 100.66 up 0.30; 15 utilities 50.09 up 0.03, and 65 stocks 104.64 up 0.30. Sales Monday approximated 1,270,000 shares compared with 1,520,000 shares traded last Friday.
