

## Agreement Seen In Bakers Strike

Portland—(U.P.)—An AFL bakers union official hinted Tuesday that agreement was possible this week ending the union's five-week-old strike.

John Leffelman, business agent for the union, told the Portland Central Labor Council that several meetings have been held with representatives of the struck wholesale bakeries. Another meeting was set for Tuesday.

"If things keep going all right, possibly we may be able to settle something this week," he said.

Meanwhile, AFL mailers reported they have reached a stalemate with the management of the Oregon Journal and the Oregonian after six months of negotiation. No further meetings have been scheduled, the union reported. No action was requested of the labor council.

Only about 100 people turned up to observe his annual "passing" Sunday, compared with 1,200 the year before when he first held his own funeral with a \$4,000 casket, a preacher imported from Kansas, and all the trimmings.

The casket, the preacher, the recorded religious music, and the "corpse" himself acting as usher, master of ceremonies and chief mourner all were on hand again Sunday, but only a few friends and a smattering of curiosity seekers showed up.

"I'll do something real spectacular for next year's services," Gernhart said.
