Anti-Gambling Bill

Petitions seeking to place a measure on the November general election ballot which would outlaw pari-mutuel gambling in Oregon are being circulated in Medford, it is reported here this week by the Rev. Meredith Groves, minister of the First Methodist church here.

The state-wide petition circulated is under the sponsorship of the Oregon Council of Churches. If placed on the ballot and approved by the voters, the measure would prohibit state-conducted gambling on horse and dog races, now allowed by Oregon law.

The Rev. Mr. Groves said that petitions are available at the church office, and that those wishing to assist in circulating them will be welcome.
