the committee to draft bills to accomplish these specific policies:

- 1: Eliminate the complexities of offsetting procedures in the application of income, excise and property taxes.
- 2: Make income and excise tax revenues unrestrictedly available for general appropriation.
- 3: Remove the state from the property tax field as far as feasible.
- 4: Provide a simple process for computing and collections any property taxes necessary.

In addition, he said, the resolution authorized the committee to include in such bills other corrective and clarifying changes and prepare without recommendation bills for new revenue sources.

State's Tax Revenues Above Expectations

Salem—(U.P.)—Oregon has collected more money in personnel income and corporate taxes than it anticipated.

And T. A. Lindstrom, analyst for the State Tax commission, told the legislative interim committee on tax study that it now appears Oregon will have \$12,000,000 more money available at the beginning of the 1953 legislative session than at the beginning of the 1951 session. There were predictions at the 1951 session that the state might face a deficit in the 1953-55 biennium. After hearing that the state might have more rather than less money in its coffers when the legislature next meets, Sen. Eugene Marsh, McMinnville, chairman of the interim group, said:

Concern Lessons

"In view of this prediction, I do not think that this committee need be as much concerned with new state revenues now as was the case a few months ago."

One source of "new state revenues" suggested was a retail sales tax, with food and medicine items exempted. Oregon is the only state on the Pacific Coast without a sales tax.

The committee under joint resolution adopted by the 1951 legislature was directed to prepare new revenue bills and present them to the 1953 legislature without recommendation. To this end, the committee will ask the state tax commission to prepare certain revenue bills which will be checked by the committee. New bills presented are expected to include provisions for a gross business tax, elimination of the exemption on payments of federal income tax and possibly some others proposed to the committee.
