Phoenix Club Sets Annual Election For Monday Night

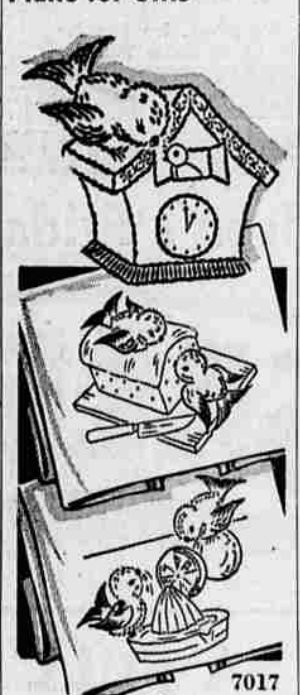
Phoenix — The monthly meeting of the Phoenix Community club and Youth Center will be held Monday, June 16, at the clubhouse at 8 p.m.
