States Increasingly Turn To Interstate Compacts

Chicago — (U.P.) — States are turning increasingly to interstate compacts to help each other in coping with mutual problems, it is reported in 1952-53 "Book of the States."

The book is published by the Council of State Governments. It says the heightened activity in the compact field has been featured during a two-year period by a compact for the supervision of parolees and probationers. It was the first interstate compact to be ratified by all 48 states.

Important for the future, the article said, is the trend toward compacts to establish joint educational or institutional services among the states.

The first program linking states in a joint educational venture was that of the southern regional group in 1948. Fourteen states extending from Maryland south and west to Texas are members of the compact.

Facilities Shared
Under the southern compact, facilities for medical, dental, veterinary and social work education have been made available to students of all member states. Thus, students may cross state lines for training not available in their own states without paying out-of-state fees.

A similar plan proposed among 11 western states together with Alaska and Hawaii became effective in 1951 for five of them with the ratification of the compact by Colorado, Montana, New Mexico, Oregon and Utah.

The article said civil defense compacts also are on the increase. Ratified by 10 States.

A compact providing for mutual aid among the signers in

case of attack has been ratified by 10 states in the northwest. The compact provides for mutual aid and for the duties, rights, immunities and privileges of the civil defense forces of an aiding state when answering a request for help from another state. It also provides for any liability that may occur and establishes a basic principle as to costs.

In California 45.7 million acres of land are federally owned.

My brother Andy and I, like many other youngsters, followed the hobby of collecting birds.

eggs when we were kids. This now seems nearly as cruel as "hunting" deer, rabbits or pheasants for the pleasure of killing. But I do not recall that ours or other good parents ever tried to discourage the robbing of bird nests.

I usually did the climbing after Andy had found the nests. One spring the robins nested in a tree in the garden. Robins' eggs, for some reason I have forgotten, were exempt, but I climbed the tree to see how many eggs were in the nest. I held one out to show Andy—

and accidentally let it fall and break. Thereafter all summer long every time I poked my head out the door the robins swooped down at me in the most terrifying fashion. To this day every time I see a robin I am conscious of a little pang of remorse, mingled with admiration for the courage of the harbinger of spring.

Perhaps I am getting mushy, for I no longer care to do any fishing, although I get as much pleasure as ever from going through the motions except the killing. The desire to kill fish was knocked out of me for good when I witnessed a tragedy on the Columbia river. A salmon climbing the fish ladder on the way up river to spawn over-jumped and landed on the platform, where some youths waiting for just such an opportunity, clubbed the fish to death and hurriedly carried it away. Up to that time I had never thought much about it, but having marvelled at the mystery of life as I did there beside the fish ladders, I vowed I'd never again kill or maim for sport or pastime.

"That reminds me"—a familiar expression, isn't it? It is by the association of ideas that we remember nearly if not everything we remember, although the association may not be clear or it may even seem absurd. Niagara Falls impressed me little if any more than the spill of water over the millpond dam in Canandaigua outlet near Shapinville. The Grand Canyon—well, it is there, all right, for I have seen it, although I found nothing about it to remember. Al, but I catch my breath at the recollection of the Valley of a Thousand Hills up country back of Durban, South Africa, in February (mid summer south of the Equator). Niagara Falls is associated with tragedy; the Grand Canyon with

wrath; the Valley of a Thousand Hills with beauty, peace and majesty.

It is a moot question whether the association of pleasant or unpleasant ideas is the greater aid to memory. Psychologists say people tend to forget things that have unpleasant associations and remember even minor incidents or experiences that had pleasant associations. I don't know about that, in fact I doubt it, but then, I'm not a psychologist. Tell me what you think about it, in less than two or three thousand words.

Vancouver, Wash. — (U.P.) — Examinations for appointment to the United States Military academy at West Point, N.Y., will be held at Vancouver barracks here on July 14, the Department of the Army has announced.
