These lines were written by Tommy Thompson, wheel chair veteran of World War I, wounded in action and decorated with the croix de guerre. Hardly a special occasion passes without some tribute in verse from the pen of Camp White's poet laureate.

The occasion for this expression of sentiment was the June birthday party sponsored by Navy Mothers, who are noted for their delicious pies served at their regular monthly card party.

Birthday parties are held exclusively for the men born in each of the months of the birthday visit by one of the VAVS organizations. Tommy wrote these lines knowing that he could not attend the party. But he wanted to give credit to Navy Mothers, who saw to it that he did not have to wheel back to bed without a quota of ice cream and cake.

Tommy's usually on hand for every gathering. The troubadour sings songs to him and he beams acknowledgement. His birthday is in July and it may be possible for one of the other poets at the domiciliary to respond with a tribute in verse to him.

He is a native of New Brunswick, Canada, but has his home in Aberdeen, Wash.

BE YOUR AGE

Far from doing half a dozen rolls first thing every morning, as I advise, most persons past forty or fifty are too brittle or stiff to try such a silly stunt. They regard it as silly because they are too old for their years. Not long ago a reader who said he is 74 years old asked whether his silly stunt—bending and touching his toes without bending the knees—which he does 50 times a day, is beneficial in any way.

Well, yes it is more beneficial than just sitting there, I suppose, if as the man says, he has retired from active work.

But better than doing that toe-touching stunt 50 times a day, for any one past forty who wants to keep in fair condition, would be a half dozen somersaults as a regular routine first thing every morning.

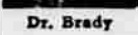
These movements are described and illustrated in the booklet **The 7 Keys to Vite**, for which send 25c and stamped, self-addressed envelope.

I do not advise old crocks to try somersaulting if they have not indulged in any such child play in recent years. In fact I do not recommend that any one roll somersaults except at his or her own peril. That's a Scandinavian Hibernicism, but the man has the right idea. Probably very few persons sixty-five years old could dog-trot half the distance. For that

HOLD FAMILY POW-WOW BEFORE MAKING MERGER

Remarriage requires even more thoughtful consideration than a first marriage does. The most serious problem usually centers around the children. That is what is bothering the widow who writes:

(Q) "I am very much in love with a man who has four children, ranging from 12 to 17 years of age. I have three children, two sons in the service and a 13-year-old daughter. My mother advised me to marry a man with no family. She said children on both sides may bring unhappiness. Do you agree?"

(A) Children on both sides may bring unhappiness but it is not necessary. It is up to the parents to adjust things so that all of the children will get a fair deal and that there will be no favoritism.

It is usually the wife who is responsible for any trouble there may be in a family where there are children who have no blood ties to one another. It is natural for a wife to favor her own children but she should not do so if she is married to the other children's father.

The problem rests squarely on your shoulders. If you feel that you can accept the four children of the man you love as your own and treat them as you would your own, the chances are very good for a happy and successful marriage. If you can't do this, follow your mother's advice and don't remarry unless you can find a man with no family.

Children Need Home

The children on both sides are still young enough to be at home for a number of years. It is not as if they were all old enough to be planning homes of their own. Furthermore, they are in the teens and this is a trying age at the best. You will have a difficult job on your hands if you take over a group of teenagers, but if you love this man enough, you will make a success of that job.

Before you make a definite decision, I urge you to call a joint meeting of both families. Have a party and make everyone feel at home. Then, when you sense that all is going well, put the matter up to them frankly. Tell them that you and their father are in love and want to marry. Ask them if they think they could be happy with you and your daughter. If you handle the matter correctly, I guarantee that they will answer "Yes."

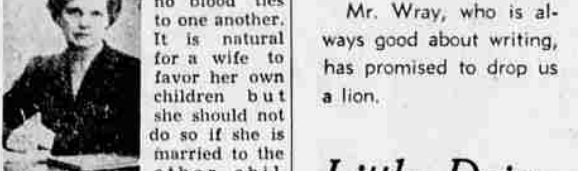
