Timber Products Bid High on O-C Timber

Timber Products company, Medford, was the successful bidder this week on 5,795,000 board feet of O and C timber in the Forest Creek area. The successful oral bid totalled \$110,544.25, compared with an appraised price of \$103,660.25. There was only one other bid.

Bid prices and appraisals on individual species included Douglas fir, \$18.65 and \$17.45 a thousand board feet; Ponderosa pine, \$25.60 and \$24.50 a thousand board feet; and Incense cedar, \$6.15 and \$6.15 a thousand board feet.

A second tract of timber offered for sale by the Bureau of Land Management, including 1,260,000 board feet of Douglas fir and Ponderosa pine on Elk creek, received no bids. The tract will be open for bids for a 90-day period, according to BLM officials.
