Slippery Bilker Of Public Object of Widespread Hunt

Springfield, Ill.—(U.P.)—Slippery Robert Knetzer, the alfalfa field auto tycoon who bilked the car-hungry public of more than \$3,000,000 after World War II, is the object of a nationwide search.

Knetzer, in the latest of his schemes, Tuesday engineered the first escape from the Springfield city jail in 20 years. He slipped

away with a man posing as a U. S. Marshal.

Investigation Launched

Authorities indicated they had almost no idea where he might be, but they launched into a meticulous investigation.

Every guard and every policeman on duty in the jail were questioned.

The guard who blandly let Knetzer and his "U. S. Marshal" escort slip out the back door of the jail was suspended and charges of negligence and disobedience were placed against him.

Visitors Questioned

All of Knetzer's visitors in the past weeks were questioned. Some were known to have been placed under police and FBI surveillance.

The escape was such an undercover affair that even Knetzer's attorney was taken by surprise.

The lawyer, William N. Giffin, said he was "flabbergasted," then added: "But I've been flabbergasted before in this case."

U. S. District Attorney Howard L. Doyle said that at about 3:30 a.m. Tuesday a stocky, middle-aged man came to the jail and told night jailer Melvin Palmer that he was "George Hullem," a U. S. Marshal.

Identification Produced He produced papers to identify himself, and said he wanted

Knetzer and would return him later in the day.

Palmer woke Knetzer who dressed quickly. Upon meeting the "marshal" he said simply "all right" and Palmer let the two of them out the back door.

They have not been seen since.

Small Businesses Not To File Sales Reports

Portland — (U.P.) — Portland District OPS Director Carl C. Donough said effective Thursday small eating and drinking establishments would be relieved from filing cost and sales reports under a new restaurant price law.

"Small establishments" were defined as places doing under \$24,000 annual gross business, or an average of \$2,000 monthly if open only part of a year.
