The chorus, which the director hopes will be at least 40 voices, will sing for a special concert which will be one of the important features of the 1952 festival.

Other company members will play with the orchestra or small instrumental groups which Director Lampl will coach.

The a cappella chorus will rehearse twice each week, in Medford on Monday evenings and in Ashland on Friday evenings. Mr. Lampl will meet the singers Monday, June 23, between the hours of 4:30 and 6:30 p.m. at Lincoln school gymnasium in Medford and anyone interested in singing with the chorus is asked to see him during these hours. It is not necessary that the singers be trained, it is said, although desirable.

String players will rehearse Wednesday and Saturday evenings and brass and woodwind players will rehearse with the strings Saturday. These rehearsals will probably be held in Ashland.

A Madrigal group is also being formed for experienced singers, and this group will rehearse in Ashland three times a week in the afternoons.

A varied program of both sacred and secular music of the Elizabethan period is being planned by Director Lampl for the festival concert, which will be given August 29.

Mr. Lampl, on the music faculty of the University of Southern California, plays the violin and piano and has had much experience in conducting and directing.
