Last year Harold Schilling was both grand chancellor of the Montana Knights of Pythias and president of the state Kiwanis.

He was traveling to California from Seattle on a vacation trip when he became ill. He had been attending a Kiwanis convention in Seattle. Raymond Schilling came here by train from Butte, Mont., when he heard of his brother's illness. Raymond Schilling also holds high office in the Montana KPs. He is supreme chancellor of the Montana chapter. He also was deputy imperial prince of the Dramatic Order of the Knights of the Khorassan.

Jealous Husband Admits Shooting Dunsmuir Trucker

Yreka, Calif. — Sheriff Al Cottar said Monday a jealous husband signed a statement admitting he shot a truck driver five times "point blank" after forcing his car off the road in an 85-mile-an-hour chase.

Jeffrey Hawkins, 42, a Dunsmuir railroad engineer, and his wife Mildred, 37, were held for questioning as a result of the death late Saturday of Clyde Jordan, 35, of Dunsmuir.

Cottar said Mrs. Hawkins was a passenger in Jordan's car during the 23-mile pursuit down Highway 97.

The sheriff quoted Hawkins as saying he had chased Jordan, fired 22 bullets at his car, and shot Jordan five times when he caught him, out of jealousy.

Mrs. Hawkins said she had left Klamath Falls, Ore., during the chase with a woman friend, then accepted Jordan's offer of a ride the rest of the way from the spot north of Weed.

Jury Sees Photos Of Kadar Child

Portland — (UP) — Life-size colored slides of the body of three-year-old Sherrie Kader were exhibited Monday in the first degree murder trial of Mrs. Jada Z. Kader.

Dr. Howard L. Richardson, pathologist from the state crime detection laboratory, showed four pictures of the child and said in his opinion asphyxiation was the cause of the youngster's death.

Dr. Richardson took the stand after Eugene Sing, stepfather of Mrs. Kader, testified he did not see her at the Portland police headquarters after 1 a. m. Jan. 26.

The statement was in direct opposition to testimony by the state that Mrs. Kader and Sing confronted each other at the police station shortly after she accused him of killing Sherrie.

Mr. and Mrs. Harold Sanders recently moved from Medford into their newly completed home on the corner of Main and East Main streets, of Rogue River. Last year, Sanders dismantled the old two story white house which stood under the large madrone and oak trees on the old Harper ranch (in more recent years called the "Pear" Jones orchards) and this spring began building a modern ranch type dwelling. The view windows of the new house overlook the old pear orchard on the south, with the sawmill and mountains in the background.

The first white man's dwelling to occupy this beautiful building site by the Old Stage road, was a log house, the pioneer home of William and Sarah Harper. About 1910 it was demolished to make way for a two story frame structure built by E.E. Bagley, and the frame house in turn was dismantled by Sanders. In clearing the site, Sanders carefully retained the old log fruit room which was a part of the original pioneer buildings.

Through the many years it has been hidden from view by the first two houses, now it stands, revealed at the right of the new house, and according to Sanders will be included in the landscape plans and will be used as a garden house.

Sight of the old log cool room awoke memories of the early days and a local woman tells of her family's arrival here, in a covered wagon when she was a small child. She stated they camped under the big trees in the Harper yard and "Grandma" Harper brought a large pitcher of milk from the cool room, for the "emigrant" children. It was the first milk they had had since the wagon train left Missouri.

Another interesting part of the old house which Sanders saved but has not used, were the three hand made doors. Each one is made from a single wide board.
