

Dewey Hard at Work To Deliver N. Y. Delegation to Eisenhower

(Editor's note: Following is another in a series of dispatches discussing the Republican presidential race in crucial states. Developments in these states will be covered in periodic dispatches until the convention begins.)

Albany, N. Y.—(U.P.)—Gov. Thomas E. Dewey has called on all the political know-how that twice carried him within the shadow of the White House to check the first open break in the New York delegation which he expects to deliver to Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower.

Dewey, one of the first Eisenhower supporters and long-time political foe of Sen. Robert A. Taft, is confident the bulk of the state's 96 Republican National Convention votes will follow his lead at Chicago. He had claimed 95 delegates, but a break to the Taft camp in the 19th New York District has forced him to revise his figures.

Richard Neville, president of the New York City East Side Republican Club, has come out

for the Ohio senator. "I like Ike—but I like Taft better," Neville said.

Comment Refused

Another delegate, Edward J. McCormick of Staten Island, was elected in the spring primary on a Taft ticket.

Republican State Chairman William L. Pfeiffer, one of Dewey's political advisers, refused to comment on Neville's decision but said he was confident the rest of the delegation "will back the state Republican organization and state committee in their support of General Eisenhower."

A bitter Eisenhower-Taft feud for the state's uncommitted delegates has been raging since the April primary. Taft backers predict 17 or 20 New York first ballot votes. Both camps have overestimated their strength.

Recent private preference polls give Eisenhower 82, Taft seven, and seven pledged. But the governor has a way of persuading state political leaders to change their minds.

The political team which won Dewey the distinction of being the first defeated Republican presidential candidate ever to be renominated is at work for Eisenhower. They are pulling no punches.

National Committeeman J. Russell Sprague and Herbert Brownell, the governor's top lieutenants, opened New York Eisenhower headquarters at Chicago this week. James C. Hagerty, Dewey's publicity chief, took a leave of absence from his state job to push the general's drive. Dewey is in complete charge.

"We haven't played all our cards yet," one adviser said. "And you can't count on what they are saying now. Let's wait until the convention."

Reports on methods being used by the governor to keep the delegates in line vary. One is that he has promised to complete his current term as governor, which expires in 1954, and not accept any position in Washington. Taft charged he "threatened" delegates. But the truth is that it's just old-fashioned politics.

As chairman of the delegation, Dewey will summon the New York delegation for a caucus at Chicago. This may occur early in the Texas issue goes to the floor.
