Latin Lover Gives Version of Slaying

St. Louis, Mo., (U.P.)—Jose Romero, 23-year-old confessed killer, languished in his jail cell Friday after telling police the lurid details of a midnight clash in which he strangled his ex-dancing teacher and former sweetheart.

Romero is under arrest on charges of first degree murder and was held for a grand jury investigation.

The Mexican walked casually into police headquarters late Wednesday and gave his version of the slaying of Mrs. Irene Thompson, pretty 30-year-old mother of one child.
