Steps Being Taken To End Pollution Of Rivers in State

Salem —(U.P.)— Oregon is taking its river pollution problem seriously.

A total of \$17,550,000 has been spent since January, 1946 in construction of sewage treatment plants and other facilities to eliminate pollution in the Willamette river.

The report was made to Gov. Douglas McKay by Curtiss M. Everts Jr., chief state sanitary

engineer and secretary of the Oregon State Sanitary Authority.

More to Be Spent

Everts told the governor that another \$3,117,500 will be spent this year by municipalities in the anti-pollution drive for a whopping total of more than \$20,000,000.

Everts reported that 28 sewage disposal plants have been

built or enlarged. Seventeen were constructed by cities and housing subdivisions and 11 were expansions of existing plants.

Institutions Connected

All state institutions in the Salem area now are connected to sewers, Everts said. Plans now are being made for construction of a sewage treatment plant for the MacLaren school for boys near Woodburn.

Before the sanitary authority was organized, 24 small sewage treatment plants had been built. But seven of these need replacement or enlargement, Everts said. Six new treatment plants and enlargement of three existing plants are in the planning stage.

Everts said nine cities along the Willamette river need both sewer systems and sewage treatment plants before the program for cities and towns is completed.

Industries Cooperate

Industries using the river for elimination of industrial waste are cooperating with the sanitary authority, Everts said.

Cooperating in this program for the Willamette river have been to date, 24 canneries, four pulp and paper mills, one hardwood mill, three meat packing plants, one tannery and four flax retting plants. Thirteen industries whose wastes are reaching streams through public sewer systems will be provided with treatment by municipal plants by the end of 1953, Everts forecast.

First Federal's Assets Now Over \$2,000,000 Mark

Publication of the June 30 statement of the First Federal Savings and Loan Association of this city will show assets in excess of two million dollars, according to an announcement today by George M. Roberts, president of the institution. This indicates a growth within the past two and one-half years of more than 100 per cent, making this local association one of Oregon's fastest growing institutions, Roberts states.

The First Federal Savings and Loan Association was chartered in 1934 to a group of Medford business men headed by Fred L. Heath, as president, with initial assets of approximately \$60,000. William H. Fluhrer succeeded Heath as president in 1940 and served in that capacity until his death in 1948. The association's assets at that time were near the million dollar mark. Roberts was elected president at the October, 1948, board meeting.

Through membership in the Federal Home Loan Bank system, the First Federal Savings and Loan Association has reserve bank privileges and provides insurance on all savings and investment accounts up to \$10,000, according to a spokesman, who added: "This security, combined with sound business management and general growth throughout the area, accounts for the remarkable expansion of the association during the past two and one-half years."

"Glenn L. Jackson, of Medford, was elected to the association's board of directors at the June 17 meeting of that group, succeeding the late Max Peirce. Jackson, a native of this state, is a member of the governor's committee for Oregon industrial development, and in this capacity has played a prominent role in the expansion of Oregon's industries and payrolls and fuller utilization of the state's resources. He is president of two of this area's larger industries, the White City Lumber company and Southern Oregon Sugar Pine Corporation, and is vice-president and a director of the California Oregon Power Company.

"Mr. Jackson also has substantial interests in the Willamette Valley, including business and farming properties in Linn county. He is a vice-president of the

Standard Insurance company of Portland and co-owner of the Albany Democrat-Herald, one of Oregon's best known and long established daily newspapers, and of Albany's radio station, KWIL."

Dividend Voted

Directors of the First Federal Savings and Loan Association voted a dividend for the first six months of 1952 on the basis of 3

per cent per year, payable July 1, on all investment and savings accounts, according to R. F. Kyle, manager of the association. "This dividend rate is higher than is generally paid by savings and loans associations in other Oregon communities and throughout the nation," the manager stated.

Officers of the association are George M. Roberts, president; A. J. Hanby, vice-president; R. F. Kyle, secretary-treasurer and general manager. The board of

directors also includes Ralph H. Norris, Herb Grey, W. H. Reichstein and Glenn L. Jackson. Mary Jane Myers, assistant secretary-treasurer, and Robert F. Kyle, Jr., assistant manager, complete the staff.
