

Clinic for Child Guidance Subject Of Meeting Here

Further plans toward eventual establishment of a child guidance clinic in Jackson county were made Friday at a meeting of representatives of interested agencies and organizations.

First step in these plans will be to acquaint residents of southern Oregon with the purposes and the need for such a clinic, a spokesman for the group stated.

Plans were made to provide program materials covering various mental health subjects and child guidance clinics to all interested groups for use in programs next fall and winter. This material will include films, speakers, books, panel discussions and pamphlets and will be available after the first of August to any group in the county.

Program chairman or presidents of organizations desiring the material are asked to call Mrs. Dunbar Carpenter at 2-4838 or Mrs. Henry Padgham at 2-4248.

Child guidance facilities in the county are inadequate to both public and private groups. There are now only two clinics each year provided by the University of Oregon Medical school and it is doubtful if they will be continued, they state.

Agencies expressing the need for clinical services here include officials of the county and city schools, the medical profession, the juvenile court, public health groups and the welfare commission. Working with representatives from these public groups to establish such a clinic are members representing the Jackson County Public Health association, the Council for Children and Youth, PTA groups, service clubs and churches. Anyone wishing to participate or desiring further information was invited to call Mrs. Carpenter or Mrs. Padgham.

In forming plans for financial arrangements for such a clinic, the committee felt there should be the widest possible participation in financing, including funds from public agencies using the service, small fees from parents seeking help with problems as well as contributions from private individuals and groups throughout the county.

College Professors To Study Valley's Natural Resources

Forty college professors, representing all parts of the United States, who are studying the natural resources of southwestern Oregon, will arrive in Medford on Tuesday on a tour sponsored by the natural resources department of Oregon State college.

While here, the authorities on natural resources will attend a Tuesday evening dinner meeting at 6:30 o'clock in the Medford hotel, at which Glenn Jackson, vice president of the California-Oregon Power company, will deliver a talk on this area's resources. The public is invited to attend this dinner meeting, which will be sponsored by the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce.

A field trip will be held Wednesday and will include trips through the area with examples shown of horticulture, agriculture and forestry, including diversified farming programs, dairying, forest products, processing plants, sustained yield programs of various tree species and work at the Southern Oregon Branch Experiment station at Talent.

Dr. J. G. Jensen, professor of natural resources at OSC, is in charge of the tour.

BRING THIS SHIRKER TO HEEL—VIA COURTS

When a man leaves his wife penniless and runs off with a young girl, the wife should not suffer because she is to proud to risk a scandal. That is the predicament this 52-year-old woman is in:

Q. "Seven years ago, I lost a son who was 26. Seven months after that, my husband ran off with a 19-year-old girl, taking with him every penny we had saved together and also all of my son's money. My son, who trusted his dad, left everything in his name when he left for the air corps. My son was married and left his insurance—part to his wife and part to me. I do get a small sum from the government, but it is far from enough to get along on. How can I find out where my husband is? Would he have to support me? I have found out from her people that he is not with the girl any more."

(A) Go to your minister at once, explain all the circumstances of your case, and ask him to put the matter in the hands of the court. The court will be able to trace your husband and bring him back to answer charges.

It's likely he has spent all the money. That is going to make it hard on your daughter-in-law as well as on you because her husband's money should rightfully go to her.

If your husband is working, he will be required by law to support you. If he has any money saved or any left from what you and he saved, the courts will see to it that you get your share. It is not necessary for a wife to work if her husband is earning money, even if he has left her.

Don't left false pride stand in your way. Bring this whole matter to a show-down. You should have done that seven years ago when your husband ran off.

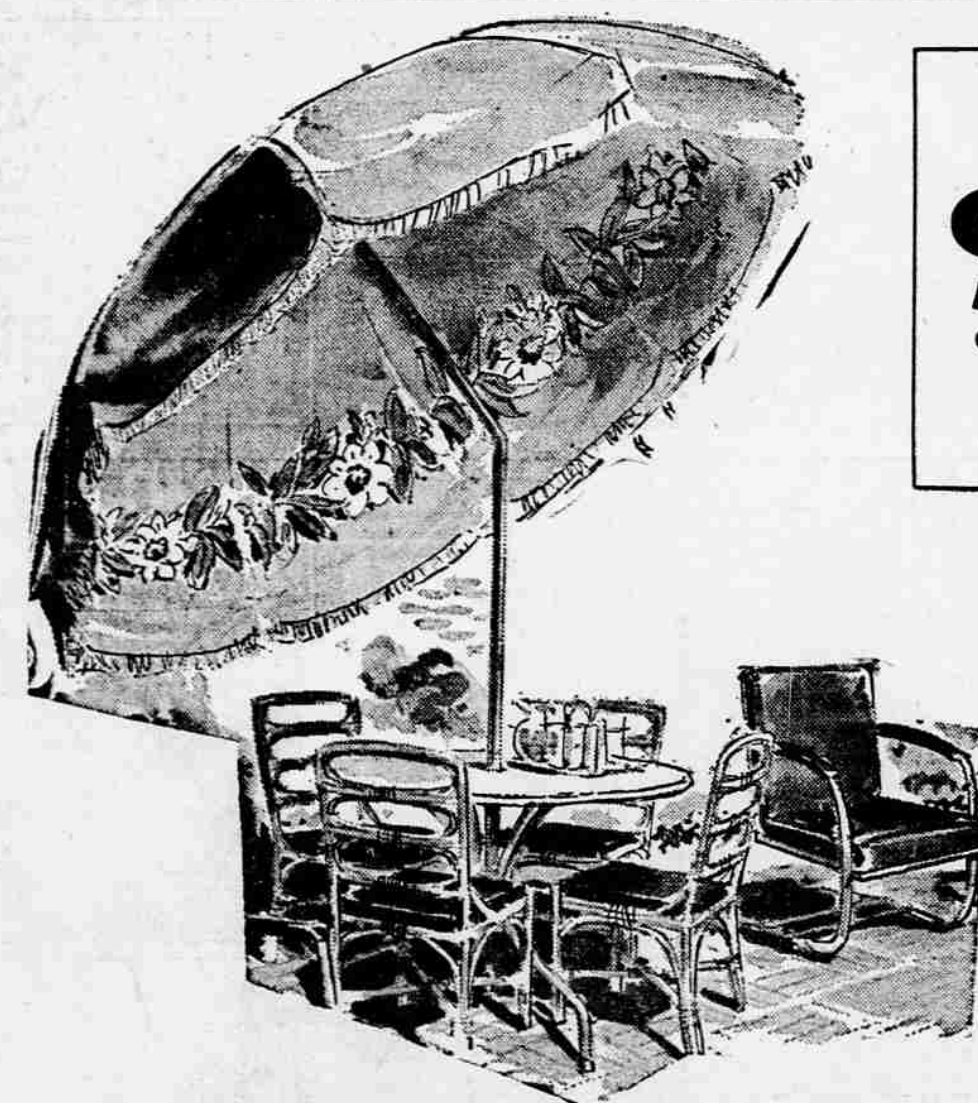
