Composed of four young people and one adult counselor, each caravan team is especially trained to give leadership and direction to the development of a youth program, fulfilling the ideals and purposes of the Methodist Youth Fellowship in each local church. Caravanners assist local youth in planning programs of evangelism, world friendship, and community service.

Sponsored by staff members of the Methodist Board of Education, Nashville, Tenn., the five training centers are located at Simpson College, Indianola, Ia.; Scarritt College, Nashville, Tenn.; McMurry College, Abilene, Tex.; Lyscoming College, Williamsport, Penn.; and College of the Pacific in Stockton, Calif.

Now in its 14th year, the Methodist Caravan program has reached more than a million people in over 14,500 churches across the nation and overseas, the release stated.
