LEGIONNAIRE NEGLECTS HOME AND FAMILY FOR LODGE LIFE

Every adult should show an interest in the social and civic life of his community. As far as possible he should make some contribution to the different organizations of the community, in work or money or both. But, there is a limit to which his contributions should go. The man described here has certainly gone far beyond:

"My husband is 17 years my senior. Well, that doesn't bother me but he is the head of an organization that is very nice to a certain extent. But he just lives 'Legion'. No matter what I want done around the house or what our 7-year-old daughter wants her daddy to do, the Legion must come first, last, and always. He usually says 'I have a meeting,' and is gone for hours. He takes the car so I have to stay at home. I belong to the Ladies Auxiliary, but can't go as I have to stay at home with our daughter. I have put up with this for seven years and now am at the end of my rope."

Your husband's work for the Legion is commendable but he has carried it too far. Surely there must be other men in it who can share some of the responsibilities for its work. As head of it of course, he must preside over the meetings. But I am sure they do not have daily meetings.

Why not put your foot down firmly and insist that he assume his duties as husband and father as well as head of the Legion? In-

sist that he turn over some of the work to other members so he can be with his family part of the time.

If he refuses to do this, hire someone to do the jobs around the house that a husband generally does. After he has paid a few bills for such work, he may decide that it would be wiser to do them himself.

As for the Ladies Auxiliary, you should not give up the fun and recreation. Hire someone to stay with your daughter so you can go to the important meetings or the parties. This you are entitled to, just as your husband feels that he is entitled to attend as many of the Lodge meetings as he wishes.

Because your husband is so much older than you, he may find family life with a young child less interesting than he would if he were younger. But that does not free him from his marital responsibilities. See that he fulfills them.

NOW, SEE HE RE, DOCTORS

A five-year-old boy died four hours after tonsillectomy without regaining consciousness after the operation.

A relative said the child "was in good health and had not suffered any major illness prior to his sudden death."

I obtained that information from a newspaper report published May 15.

I wonder why the doctor deemed it necessary to subject the child to a major operation if the child was in good health.

Another newspaper report published May 22 tells of the death of a young woman "while having her tonsils removed under anesthesia in the operating room at a hospital." The medical examiner stated officially that the young woman's death was accidental and no one was to blame. Having done so he paraded that "the cause of death was difficult to determine without an autopsy."

Now I wonder why the doctor who advised the operation thought an attempt to "get all the tonsil" was justified. But then, I think tonsillectomy is only rarely warranted anyway.

The familiar argument of the ever ready operator, that it is necessary to "get all the tonsil"—that is, the operator must leave no tonsil tissue in the throat—is absurd. The truth is that more or less tonsil tissue remains in the throat after "complete" tonsillectomy, no matter

who the surgeon may be. If I'm wrong about this isn't it the duty of the ever ready operators to correct me?

My advice to people who are being urged to undergo the major operation called tonsillectomy or to subject their children to "complete removal" of tonsils is as follows:

1. Wait a bit. Don't be rushed into the hospital. Take time to think it over. There is no emergency.
2. Children are likely to have very large tonsils in the spring and by the time school opens in the autumn—if some eager surgeon hasn't gotten them—the tonsils will have shrunk to ordinary size.
3. Where ear trouble or dulled hearing is ascribed to enlarged tonsils and/or adenoids, a series of same, painless X-ray or radium emanation treatments will probably give as good results as an operation.
4. If enlarged tonsils obstruct the breathing passages instantaneous tonsillectomy is as effective as the attempt to "get all the tonsil" and far safer.
5. The treatment of infected tonsils by diathermy (electrocoagulation) by a physician skilled in this difficult technique, is at least as effective and far safer than tonsillectomy.

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Grand Jury To Consider Crime Cases July 17

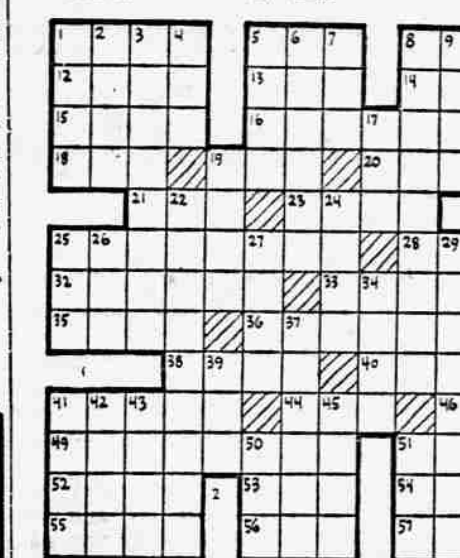

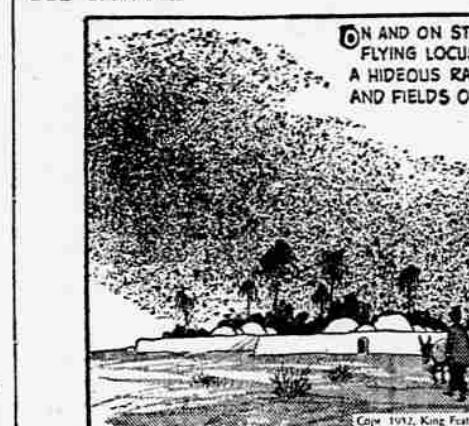
