

Douglas Doesn't Want Second Spot

Portland — (U.P.) — U. S. Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas doesn't want the vice presidential nod at the Democratic convention in Chicago, even though some Oregon voters wrote his name on the primary ballot for the vice presidency.

"If I was in politics, I'd be out for the top spot," said Douglas in an interview Tuesday while on the way to Seattle.

The justice bought a full page in the Voters Pamphlet last spring to ask Oregon Democrats not to vote for him as a presidential preference. He said his name had been put on the primary ballot against his wishes.

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Hearing Dates Fixed For Bids on Paving

The Medford city council last night set Monday, July 21, as the date by which bids must be submitted on nine street paving projects. The action followed public hearings on seven of the paving jobs. The other two were held over from a previous meeting.

Strong opposition was heard by the council on three of the proposed paving jobs. A majority of the persons appearing against the paving projects expressed the opinion that the costs are too high for the good they will receive from having their streets paved.

Projects Listed
The streets on which hearings were conducted included Keene way drive from Main street to Woodlawn drive, Taylor street from Myrtle street to end of the street, Haven street from Oak to Grape streets (two projects), Welch street from Jackson street to the railroad tracks, Crown avenue from Oregon terrace to Berkeley way, and Bennett street from Crater Lake avenue to the end of the street.

Each of the projects was approved unanimously by the council.

Paving projects held over from a previous meeting were South Peach street from 13th street to Dakota avenue, and an alley in Newtown addition.

Asks Rezoning
In other business, the council heard a request from Verl Walker, 205 West Jackson street, that a one-block area at Jackson and Woodstock streets be rezoned to a business district. Because the area was rezoned last year to a

dwelling district, Walker states that he cannot undertake extensive repairs planned for his business building without forfeiting use of it for business purposes.

Councilman Elmer Childers and City Recorder J. Ralph Woodford, who is also a member of the city planning commission, told Walker that the area "had been overlooked" when the city zoning ordinance was changed last year. A hearing before the city planning commission has been set for July 14 on the question of rezoning the area for business purposes, they stated.

To Regulate Signs
An ordinance regulating the size and safety factors of advertising within the city limits was passed by a 5 to 2 vote of the council. It has been under preparation since early this year. Councilmen voting no were John Snider and Harold Frye.

City Superintendent Robert Duff reported to the council that the Oregon civil defense agency has designated Medford to receive a radio set which will "monitor in" Grants Pass, completing a civil defense radio network.

Council President Paul Selby presided at the meeting in the absence of Mayor D. L. Flynn, who was representing the city at another meeting. The council meeting was adjourned until July 8, when the council is scheduled to conduct a hearing on the 1952-1953 city budget. (See Story on Page 1)

Central Point Sewer Contracts Circulated

Central Point — The contracts for the Freeman road sewage connection with Central Point's main are now being circulated for signatures, according to A. R. Pinkham, city recorder.

He pointed out that the installation is a contract between each of the 15 individual property owners and the contractor, and that the city is holding the money until the work is completed and passes state inspection. Pinkham explained that five of the property owners live outside the city limits and 10 live inside, making a special problem of connection.

He said that the owners will pay various amounts, with the minimum being \$125 and the maximum \$478.50, depending on their property limits. The extension will be 123 feet long and will consist of an eight-inch line.

Frogmen's Pictures Provide Useful Data

London — (U.P.) — Frogmen's movie shots of fishing trawls in action under water have provided much useful data on the action of trawls on sandbeds, a ministry of agriculture and fisheries spokesman said.

The shots taken by the frogmen were made into a film. The film will be released to interested audiences throughout the world.

Operations were carried out in the Mediterranean, in clear water flooded by sunlight, at depths of up to 20 fathoms last autumn. Action of trawls used by British, Dutch, German, and Belgian vessels was observed. They were fitted to the ministry's research ship, Sir Lancelot.
