YMCA Softballers Thump Lions; Mobilgas Cracks National Guard

YMCA remained the lone unbeaten nine in the Medford Softball association men's league by thumping the Crater Lions 13 to 5 Thursday night and Mobilgas moved into sole hold on second spot in the standings by blasting National Guard 10 to 2.

Both were five inning games, halted at that stage because of the adequate leads of the victors.

YMCA, lagging 5 to 2 when it came to bat in the fifth, piled up 11 runs in the canto to gain the decision. L scored first in the hassle with two runs in the initial chucker on singles by Willard Barnum, Don Byers and Ralph Brock, a walk, a hit batter and two fielder's options. The Lions knotted the game 2 to 2 in the second on two walks, Bessonne's triple and Hunter Dixon's single.

In the fourth the Gasmen widened to 9 to 2 on three runs on hits by George Sendelbach and Ron Singler, two walks, three errors and a passed ball.

Mobilgas went into the last half of the fifth inning needing but one run for an eight-marker margin that would give it the ball game. Connie Holzgang got to first base on an error, took second on another and third on a wild pitch. Carl Reich and John Darland both walked and Sendelbach fanned for the first out. Don Wendt then knocked a line fly to deep left field and Holzgang crossed with the winning run.

Wendt's rap got through Bob Rickman's glove in the field, but had Rickman hauled the ball in, Holzgang would have scored easily after the catch.

Congressional Quiz

Questions and Answers on What Goes on at the Capital

Q. What happened to the Federal Trade Commission's oil cartel report?

A. Sen. Thomas C. Hennings Jr., (D-Mo.), who April 16 called on the FTC to release a two-year study of "an international cartel" dealing in Middle East oil, said June 21 that President Truman was holding up the report because "it might adversely affect our foreign relations," but would let Congressional committees see it on a confidential basis. Hennings called for an investigation by the Senate Judiciary and Small Business Committees and the Justice Department.

Q. Who is on the House Committee to investigate immoral literature?

A. Named to the committee June 16 were Reps. E. C. Gathings, (D-Ark.), chairman; Reva Beck Bosone, (D-Utah), Emanuel Celler, (D-N. Y.), Francis E. Walter, (D-Pa.), George P. Miller, (D-Calif.), Edward H. Rees,

(R-Kan.), Louis E. Graham, (R-Pa.), Katharine St. George, (R-N. Y.), and Carroll D. Kearns, (R-Pa.). They will study books, magazines and comic books containing immoral and obscene matter and improperly emphasizing crime and violence.

Q. How does a soldier vote under the absentee balloting bill?

A. Under the bill passed June 20 by the Senate, a serviceman whose state does not have adequate absentee balloting laws can vote in his home state by mail if he first applies for a federal ballot. Service units would make information and post card applications available. The federal ballot could be used in voting for President, Vice-President and Congressmen.

Q. What do Congressmen think of the U.S. airpower "stretch-out"?

A. The Senate Preparedness Subcommittee, in a June 18 report, criticized the Administration decision to postpone from 1954 to 1956 completion of the proposed 143-win Air Force, and said delay would be "an invitation to disaster." A Senate Appropriations Subcommittee, in testimony released June 15, was told by top Air Force officials that by 1954 the Soviet will have two or three times as many war planes as the U.S. and maybe air supremacy too.

Q. Are the political conventions always held in Chicago?

A. No, but the Windy City has echoed convention oratory many times. In the last hundred years, the major parties have convened there 19 out of 46 times. Both great political shows were staged in Chicago in 1944, shifted to Philadelphia in 1948, and returned to Chicago for the 1952 convention.

Air Ambulance Leaves For Vancouver, B.C.

Many Bonus Checks Returned for Lack Of Address Change

Salem —(U.P.)— Many bonus checks are being returned to the bonus division because the payees failed to report their change of address after applying, the State Department of Veterans Affairs said Friday.

Hub Saalfeld, head of the bonus division, said the departments has been able to locate and pay some of these applicants whose addresses were changed. He said: "In spite of this search we still have more than 70 bonus payments on hand which were returned by the post office because the payees failed to notify either the postmaster or the bonus division of their changes of address."

All veterans who moved after applying for a bonus were reminded to notify the bonus division, State Veterans department, Salem, of their current whereabouts, giving their old and new addresses.

Next of kin of men who died in service or after discharge were also reminded that they are entitled to the bonus, if the veteran was an Oregonian for one year before entering active service. Survivors entitled, in priority, are the unmarried widow, the child or children, or the parent or parents.

Rogue River Areas To Be Opened to Public

Portland—(U.P.)—Oregon State Game Director P. W. Schneider Friday announced that 44 points along the Rogue river between Gold Beach and Prospect, 150 miles upstream, would be opened to the public.

The access sites will consist of tracts of river frontage containing from one to 100 acres with space for roads, bank fishing, boat ramps and parking areas, Schneider said. Of the 44 sites approved for development, 18 will be for bank fishing; eight will be used for boat landings and 18 will be for both bank and boat fishing.

Schneider said cost of the project will be \$35,000. The money will be derived from the federal tax on sports angling gear.
