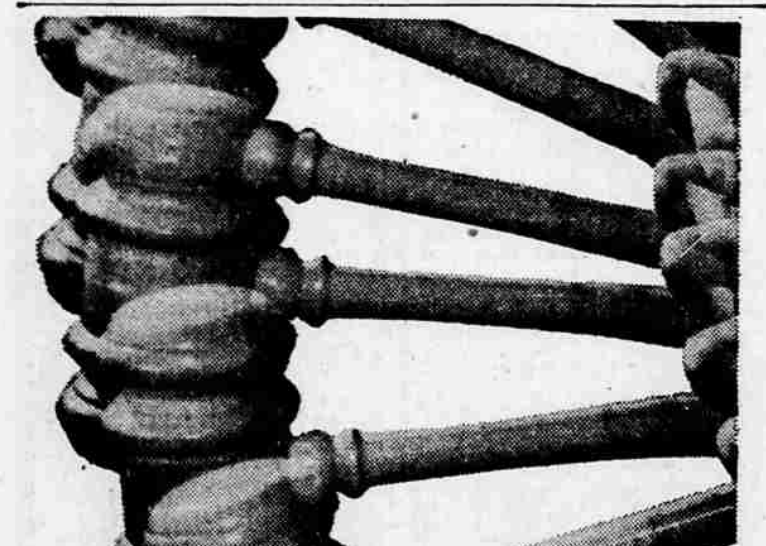

IMMUNITY FOR THE BABY

In my opinion—and please remember I'm not an authority—every baby should be immunized against smallpox at the age of four to six months and against diphtheria at the age of six months to two years.

Immunization against diphtheria is most important for children from six months to six years old. After the age of six or seven years, susceptibility to diphtheria diminishes steadily, so that immunization is no longer necessary.

With the toxoids developed in the past decade immunization against diphtheria, whooping cough or tetanus (lockjaw) may be combined in a course of three injections given over a period of 9 weeks—three weeks between injections.

Immunization against typhoid, para-typhoid, cholera or other disease to which infants or children may be exposed when on vacation, traveling or sojourning in foreign countries is a question to discuss with the family physician.

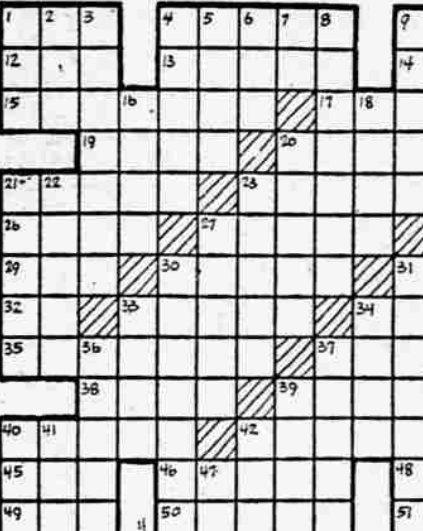
