Veteran Missionaries Return From Japan

Boston — (U.P.) — Two sisters, natives of Enfield, Conn., who together have given 76 years of service as Christian educators under the American Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions in Japan, have returned to the United States.

Miss Grace H. Stowe, 70, and Miss Mary E. Stowe, 74, were awarded the decoration of the Fifth Order of the Sacred Treasure by the Japanese government. The presentation ceremony was held at Kobe College in Kobe, where Grace has been teaching.

Mary first sailed to Japan in 1908. Grace, who earned her master of arts degree at the University of Chicago, taught in Capron Hall, Madura, India, during World War II when she was unable to remain in Japan. She returned to teach in Kobe in 1947.

Mary, after 37 years of educating the Nipponese, reached retirement age in 1945. However, she went back to Japan to keep house for her sister and continued to make remarkable contributions to the life of Kobe College.
