'Preacher' Absconds With Prisoner's Fine

Columbus, Miss. (U.P.)—A man representing himself as a preacher entered the county jail in the name of religion and knelt for an hour's prayer with a prisoner charged with drunkenness.

Several who watched were so moved by the preacher's zeal that they made donations toward the drunk's fines. The "preacher" left with \$5 to make arrangements for his convert's release.

That was the last time he was seen. "I'm going to give that preacher plenty of what he was trying to save me from," the jailed man declared, "if I ever catch up with him."

Strength of Wales Beer Subject of Controversy

Sydney, Australia (U.P.)—The strength of a glass of New South Wales beer, which hundreds of thousands of war-time American troops still fondly recall, is a subject of controversy because it has been increased by law.

Church and temperance groups and the Sunday newspaper Truth are protesting a recent act of the New South Wales parliament which sets a mandatory minimum strength of 7.3 per cent alcohol for all beer brewed in the state.

Previously, a minimum of two per cent was permissible. The legislation does not affect beers equally popular with war-time Americans which were brewed in Melbourne, Perth, Brisbane and elsewhere.

Opponents of the law complained that it threatened to turn the beer-loving Aussies into a race of drunken sots.

Government Replies
The government replied that its legislation was merely a crackdown on the watering of beer by publicans.

The newspaper Truth didn't agree that the new regulations were for the sole purpose of preventing watering. "What the government has done, in fact, is to foster the growth of a nation of pub crawlers, and to prevent any move to market a lighter beer," Truth said.

Truth went on: "In the opinion of this newspaper, the government has made a grave mistake in approving the amendment which perpetuates this state's reputation of producing one of the strongest beers in the world."

"It has now been made impossible for the breweries to meet a growing public demand for a lighter beer."

Like Their Beer
"Reduced alcoholic content is more important in beer than in spirits since Australians, for climatic and economic reasons, are a nation of beer drinkers."

"During 1949-50, Australian beer production totalled 154,188,627 gallons—an average of nearly 20 gallons for every man, woman and child in the community. If only one-third of the population drank beer, average consumption was nearly 60 gallons a head."

"Obviously, a large percentage of Australian beer drinkers drink solely for relaxation and refreshment and would welcome a lighter beer, which would not have such an evil effect on their physical and moral senses."

Others Agree
"The vicious minority, who drink to excess, until their senses are dulled and their pockets empty, need to be protected as far as possible from their craving—for their own good, and for the good of the community."

Quick to rally to the side of Truth in the "war" came clergymen and leaders of women's temperance associations. "I think the new regulations are a tragedy," said the Bishop of Armidale, the Rt. Rev. J. S. Moyes.

"Overseas servicemen told me during the war that they found Australian beer very strong and that it had drastic effects," he said.

POP QUELLS FIRE

Women Safe Robbers Start Prison Terms

Reno (U.P.)—The two women in the Redfield burglary case were en route Tuesday to a federal women's prison at Alderson, W. Va.

Mrs. Marie Michaud, 37, and Mrs. Leona Mae Giordano, 40, were taken from their cells in the Washoe county jail at 5 a.m. and placed aboard a train in custody of Deputy U.S. marshals and a matron for the long trip east.

Mrs. Michaud, who admitted she masterminded the fabulous safe burglary has been sentenced to five years in prison for carrying more than \$147,000 worth of the Redfield loot from Los Angeles to Flagstaff, Ariz.

Mrs. Giordano was sentenced to one year and one day in prison for carrying \$9,100 of the \$4,500,000 loot from Reno to

Los Angeles. She testified during her trial that she took the money from the pocket of a coat belonging to another suspect in the burglary and did not know it was Redfield money.

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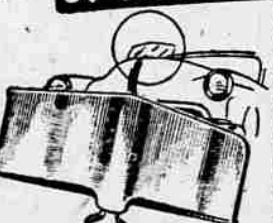

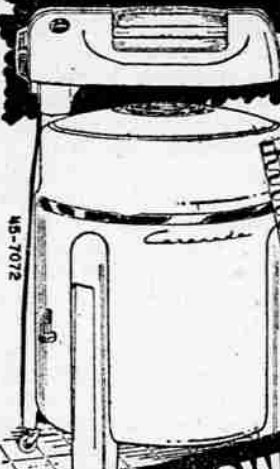

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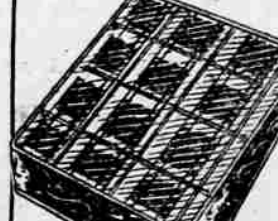
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
