Studs' Strength Tops For Drain Encounters

A Medford Cheney Studs baseball squad will go to Drain this week-end intent on strengthening its status in the southwestern Oregon league pennant chase.

The Studs, now tied for second place and hopeful of diminishing the three-game gap between them and loop-leading Drain, will be at full strength for the skirmishes on Saturday and Sunday, according to Business Manager Bill Askwith.

Medford has been bolstered also in pitching and in the field. The starting hurlers will be selected from among three men, Stud Veteran Paul Gehrmann and Seattleites Mike Budnick and Herb Karpel.

Recent Addition
Budnick was a recent addition to the Studs roster while Herb Karpel has been on the list for some time but has never reached the club for a series.

Pitchers Clarence Melby and Cliff Piland will be in reserve. Medford has one other chucker, youthful Marty Hume from Sacramento Junior college. However, he may be held for the Studs-House of David game here next Tuesday.

For the Studs during the week-end Frank Roelandt will be catcher with Melby at first base, Jack Gordon at second, Pete Bianchi at shortstop and Alex McDonald at third. The outfield will be picked from Snuffy Smith, Moose Blevins, Norm Lucich and Tom O'Donnell. The latter is a newcomer from Sacramento JC.

Daylight Time
The tussles are set for 8 p.m. Saturday and 2 p.m. Sunday. Drain daylight time (7 and 1 p.m. standard time at Medford).

The House of David ruckus here on Tuesday, July 15, will help fill a big gap in the Studs league slate on the home field. Medford's next loop fray here will be on July 27. The bearded Davids have already played a large number of teams in this area.

Semi-Finals Reached in Golf Tourney

Miami, Fla.—(U.P.)—Bob Scherer, 21-year-old upset artist from Decatur, Ill., was matched against college sophomore John Halin of Spokane, Wash., Friday in the semi-final round of the National Public Links golf championship.

The other semi-final brought together airlines pilot Bob Kurz of Miami Springs, Fla., and salesman Omer L. Borgan of South Gate, Calif.

Scherer, who works in a syrup factory during the week and plays golf only on weekends like most of the others in the original 200-man field in this tournament, captured the eye of the public as he racked up one surprise after another on his parade of the semi-finals.

Champ Ousted
Early in the contest, he put out the defending champion, Dave Stanley of Los Angeles, then A. C. Sword of Dallas, Tex., and on Thursday defeated Tommy Bean of Trion, Ga., one-up in the quarter-finals.

Kurz moved up Thursday by outgunning Donald Thornton of Los Angeles, 2 and 1. Bogan had to come from behind to defeat W. A. Dub Pagan, the Florida state champion from West Palm Beach, Fla., 2 and 1, in a surprise. Halin, who is a student at Washington State college, defeated Arnold G. Koehler of Indianapolis, Ind., 2 and 1.

The semi-final matches Friday will be over 36 holes at the 6,511-yard Miami Country Club course.

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Rookie Leader In Red Hot Field At St. Paul Open

St. Paul, Minn.—(U.P.)—Drawing Henry Ransom, St. Andrews, Ill., and rookie Al Besse-link, Escondido, Calif., led a red-hot field today into the second round of the \$15,000 St. Paul Open golf tournament at Keller course.

Ransom and Besse-link carded 8 under-par 64's over the first 18 Thursday to pace the greatest par-breaking field to play the Keller course in more than 20 years. Thirty-seven golfers posted scores below par 72 before the first round ended.

High on the list were Dr. Cary Middlecoff, Memphis, Tenn., and Ted Kroll, New Hartford, N. Y., who fired 65's to share second place at the end of the opening round.

Third Split
Slammin' Sammy Sneed of White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., split third place with Buddy Viar, St. Louis, Mo., with both men carding 66's; Milton Marusic, Herkimer, N. Y.; Johnny Palmer, Radin, N. C.; and Ralph Bloomquist, Eagle Rock, Calif., came in with 67's.

By the end of Friday's round, all but the 60 low scorers were to be eliminated. The tournament continues through Sunday, with a top prize of \$2,400 going to the winner.

Stock Car Races Here On Sunday
