Nearly two families out of three in the United States who have young children are either buying something on the installment plan or owe money for other reasons, according to a survey of non-real estate debt quoted this month by the Institute of Life Insurance. But so far, the study shows most of these young families seem to be doing a good job of managing their debts.

Based on a survey made by the research center of the University of Michigan, the report shows that families with children under eighteen are much more apt to borrow money than single persons and families without children. People in the "middle" and higher income groups are also comparatively frequent borrowers and so are young people as compared with older people.
