Plan Annual Bard's Heyday At Barnum Home July 20

Scores of valley residents and Shakespearean Festival company members are hard at work on final plans and preparations for the third annual Bard's Heyday. The Heyday, sponsored by Tudor guild, proved highly successful the past two years and is expected to draw a large attendance again.

It will be given in the gardens of the home of Mr. and Mrs. Berthold Barnum, South Pacific highway, where the event was held last year. A buffet supper will be served on the lawn at five o'clock, with a program following. The program will be given at the side of the swimming pool and will include music, dancing and other numbers. Hans Lampl, music director for the festival, will discuss the character and significance of Elizabethan music with illustrations of Tudor ballads, dance music and madrigals. He will display Elizabethan instruments.

The Madrigal singers, made up of festival members and residents of the valley, will present three characteristic Elizabethan songs under the direction of Mr. Lampl. These singers will perform before each presentation of "Much Ado About Nothing" and will sing ballads and hymns during the plays.

The Court dancers, 12 members of the festival company, will perform a pavane, a galliard and a volta on the lawn beside the pool. This troupe will dance on the green at the festival shell in Ashland before each performance of the plays in August.

Allen Fletcher, one of the play directors, will talk informally on the four plays to be presented this season. Rodney Keating, Ashland, president of the festival association, will act as master of ceremonies.

Junior Service league members will complete plans this week for the second annual Corral cabaret, to be held Saturday, July 19, at Rogue Valley Country club. The first cabaret, held last summer, was such a success that the league decided on a repeat performance this summer.

A "chuck wagon" supper will be served from 8 p.m. until 10:30 p.m. and a floor show will be staged at 11 p.m. Members of the league will appear in the show, and are busy with rehearsals and costumes. "Very informal dress" will be in order for guests, league members say.

As with past benefit events given by the league, proceeds will be used for the group's various charity projects. Since the league was organized in October of 1947, it has earned and given to various charitable and civic projects more than \$7,000. Hospitals of the city have received the largest share of this sum. Community hospital has been given \$3,015, and Sacred Heart hospital the same sum. In addition, \$43.64 has been expended on toys for child patients at the two institutions.

A total of \$600 was given in support of the juvenile court, and an additional \$50.08 for toys and other articles needed for children under the care of the court.

The league has expended \$350.29 maintaining the Red Cross blood bank canteen service, and has donated \$65 to the Red Cross for other purposes. Mercy Flights, Inc., received \$700 from the league, \$105 has been donated to the March of Dimes campaigns in past years and another \$150 went to buy a diving board for the municipal pool.

Other contributions included \$10 for the Medford High school band, \$55 to the Community chest, \$40 to the American Cancer society, \$45 to the annual Easter Seal sale, \$25 for trees at Camp White and \$25 for miscellaneous donations.

Mrs. Carl E. Wimberly, Jr., founder of the league, points out that "everything taken from the community through the league's various fund-raising events has gone back to the community."

Science at Work

New York — (U.P.) — Generally, inoculations and administration of drugs can be given to children during the polio season without fear that the medicines may aggravate polio.

That is the recommendation of health authorities.

In 1951, there was widespread discussion and public alarm concerning the possible relationship between the various types of inoculations and polio. The U. S. Public Health Service consequently made a study and had conferences with health officials over the land.

The new recommendations, as reported in the Journal of the American Medical Association, include:

There is no definite evidence that an increase in the number of cases of polio has occurred as a result of injections of vaccines, drugs and other medical agents.

There is evidence that injections for the prevention of diphtheria, whooping cough and possibly tetanus, when given during an epidemic of polio, may, on rare occasions, localize the paralysis in the inoculated arm or leg.

In the small number of persons with localization of paralysis in the inoculated limb, the injections, for the most part, were given about 7 to 21 days prior to onset, which corresponds to the usual inoculation period of polio.
