

Olympic Committee Given "Hot Potato" On German Entries

Helsinki — (U.P.) — The International Olympic committee was tossed another hot potato in sport's cold war Saturday when it was asked to decide whether both East and West Germany should be admitted to the 1952 games.

The Executive Olympic Committee had decided last winter that only West Germany should be admitted after efforts failed to organize a combined East-West entry. There was no protest from the East. But apparently the five-man executive board became jittery after a Red-Nationalist China dispute and tossed the whole business to the seven-man parent body—the International committee. Both Chinese factions want to enter basketball teams.

Thus the IOC will be asked Wednesday to do something the United Nations has been unable to do—reconcile the East and the West.

Dispute Over China Teams Provides First Incident Of 1952 Olympic Rivalry

Helsinki — (U.P.) — Basketball, a sport usually dominated by the United States, provided the first international incident of the forthcoming Olympic games Saturday.

The dispute was whether to admit Nationalist or Communist China to the games and it will have to be resolved by the International Olympic committee.

Avery Brundage, vice-president of the IOC, said a final decision will not be reached until the July 16 meeting of the committee.

The Finnish organizing committee and almost everyone else connected with the games, except U. S. basketball officials, were concerned over the controversy because of the complications which might develop.

They included the possibility that if Nationalist China is admitted Russia and her satellites might decide to withdraw from the games. But that was only a long-shot possibility because the chances are that neither Chinese group will be admitted.

The U. S., although keeping its hands off the East-West dispute, let it be known that it was

Hunting Regulations Set UP Tentatively

Portland — (U.P.) — The Oregon State Game commission in announcing tentative hunting regulations for 1952 Saturday set September 27 to October 17 for the general deer season, despite an appeal by the U. S. Forest Service to set back the opening date to October 12.

The Forest Service wanted the late opening to avoid forest fire danger. But sportsmen's organizations practically were unanimous in requesting the early opening.

The commission tackled a three-day special season on the regular dates for hunters who fail to bag their one forked antler deer. The special season, October 18-20, will allow hunters to kill a deer of either sex in large areas of the state.

Elk Season
The general elk season tentatively was set for November 1-20 with a bag limit of one bull elk in both western and eastern Oregon.

A special elk season will be held August 23-28 in the Troy section of Walla Walla county for one elk of either sex. Another special season will be November 22-26 for an elk of either sex in Umatilla county.

For the first time the Hart Mountain area in Lake county will be opened to deer hunting by bow and arrow. The archers may take one deer of either sex from September 13 to October 20.

Confusion Reported
A commission spokesman said there had been some confusion, especially among members of the Order of the Antelope, as to what opening of the Hart Mountain area to hunting meant. Some sportsmen expressed fears

Drain is in first place in the circuit and going into the weekend series Medford was knotted for second with Coos Bay-North Bend.

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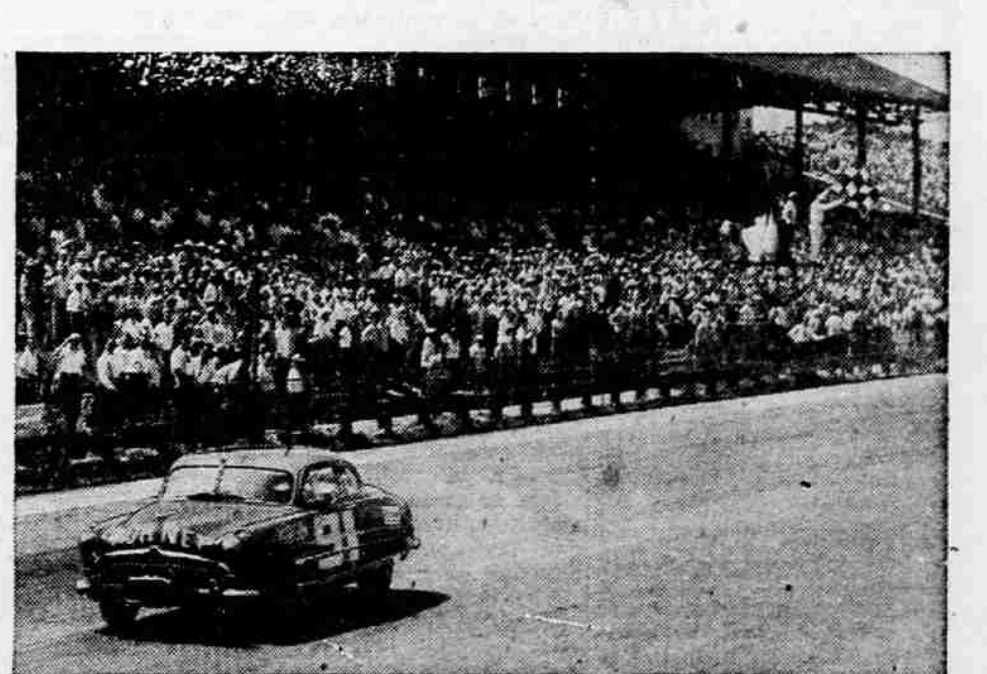
