

# Highlights of Eisenhower's Speech Accepting Nomination

Chicago — (U.P.) — Highlights of Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's speech accepting the Republican presidential nomination:

"Our aims — the aims of this Republican crusade — are clear: To sweep from office an administration which has fastened on every one of us the wastefulness, the arrogance and corruption in high places, the heavy burdens and the anxieties which are the bitter fruit of a party too long in power."

## Progressive Policies

"It is our aim to give to our country a program of progressive policies drawn from our finest Republican traditions; to unite us wherever we have been divided; to strengthen freedom wherever among any group it has been weakened; to build a sure foundation for sound prosperity and for all here at home and for a just and sure peace in our world."

"Today is the first day of our battle. The road that leads to November 4 is a fighting road. In that fight I will keep nothing in reserve."

## Will Meet The People

"In this battle to which all of us are now committed it will be my practice to meet and talk with Americans face to face in every section, every nook and cranny of this land."

"Since this morning I have had helpful and heartwarming talks with Senator Taft, Governor Warren and Governor Stassen. I wanted them to know, as I want you now to know, that in the hard fight ahead we will work intimately together . . ."

## Confidence in Purpose

"As we go to the country, Americans in every walk of life can have confidence that our single-minded purpose is to serve their interest, guard and extend their rights, and strengthen the America we love."

"It is more than a nomination I accept today. It is a dedication — A dedication to the shining promise of tomorrow. As together we face that tomorrow, I beseech the prayers of all our people and the blessing and guidance of almighty God."

"I have stood before on the eve of battle. Before every attack it has always been my practice to seek out our men in their camps and along the road and talk with them face to face about their concerns and discuss with them the great mission to which we were all committed."

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# Young Richard Nixon Reached Prominence In Alger Hiss Trial

Chicago — (U.P.) — The young man who parlayed Whittaker Chambers' pumpkin papers into a vice-presidential nomination was ready when the lightning struck.

Thirty-nine-year-old Sen. Richard M. Nixon held a midnight press conference in his hotel room after getting the Republican bid to serve notice on the Democrats and Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower that they're going to see something new in veeps when he hits the campaign trail.

**Just Two Issues**  
The Californian said that as far as he is concerned, there are only two issues—"the Truman record" and "Communism at home and abroad."

On those issues, and with Eisenhower at the head of the ticket, he said, "We can defeat any Democratic candidate."

"Because," he added, "regardless of who he is, he will be a Truman - named, Truman - controlled candidate."

**Stuck With HST Record**  
"Any Democratic candidate will be stuck with the Truman record, and that gives us our issue."

As soon as the GOP convention formally nominated him Friday night, Nixon hustled over to Eisenhower's headquarters to talk over the strategy they will follow in the election campaign.

## Wilson Executions Cleared by Court

San Francisco — (U.P.) — The Ninth U.S. Court of Appeals in effect has cleared the way for the execution of Turman G. Wilson, 25, and his brother, Utah E. Wilson, 21, for the 1950 kidnapping-slaying of Jo Ann Dwyer, 18, of Meadowdale, Wash.

The court Thursday lifted its stay preventing the execution in the Washington state penitentiary at Walla Walla. At the same time the court denied an appeal to bring a petition for release before the court.

The petition previously had been denied by Federal Judge Samuel M. Driver at Spokane.

The brothers were scheduled to die June 23, but a stay of execution was granted while the court reviewed their case.

Next step in the case will be return of the brothers to Vancouver, Wash., where, for the fourth time, an execution date will be set.

## Accident Costs High At Salem Crossings

Salem — (U.P.) — Railroad grade crossing accidents in Salem have cost half a million dollars in the last 10 years, the Salem League of Women Voters said Saturday.

The league has made a detailed study of accidents. It said replies to a questionnaire from participants in 274 of the 542 recorded grade crossing accidents showed property damage in those accidents at \$112,500.

Another \$304,000 was listed as the actual cost in 16 fatal accidents, including insurance paid to beneficiaries.

In figuring the dollar costs of accidents, the league considered vehicle repairs, cargo and clothing damage, towing charges, working time lost, attorney, doctor, nurse, medical and hospital expenses.

## Cloud-Seeders In Air Friday Afternoon

Cloud-seeding planes were in the air for 2 hours 27 minutes Friday afternoon, working on a threatening thunderhead formation over the Greensprings and Siskiyou summit areas, it was reported by the fliers Saturday.

The hail-threatening formations extended to about Ashland on the north, but might have come into the valley unless seeded, the pilots explained. Tops of the formation were around 25,000 feet, and heavy rains were reported in the mountain areas following the seeding flights.

About one hour was devoted to actual seeding, with the rest of the flights made for observation.

between now and November. He said the general agreed with him that he won't be dropped into the traditional oblivion of vice-presidents if they win the election. Eisenhower assured him, he said, that he envisioned the vice-presidency as "a job which could be greatly enlarged so far as responsibility is concerned."

## Shot to Prominence

Nixon, who wasn't even a delegate to his party's convention in 1948, skyrocketed to national prominence as a Communist-hunter. He did it without getting the "witch-hunter" tag pinned on many of his congressional colleagues.

As a member of the House Un-American Activities Committee, he hammered away at the case of State Department official Alger Hiss for months after the rest of the committee and the general public lost all interest in the affair.

President Truman unwittingly gave Nixon a helping hand by ridiculing his Communist hunt as a "red herring" — phrase that came back to haunt the President when the Californian finally bagged Hiss.

## Broke Hiss Case

Nixon broke the Hiss case wide open one night in 1948, when Whittaker Chambers led him to a pumpkin patch behind the Chambers' Maryland farm home and showed him a cache of documents linking Hiss to a Communist network in the federal government.

Those documents eventually landed Hiss in a federal prison for perjury.

Nixon broke into politics six years ago when he spotted an advertisement placed in a California newspaper by a citizens' committee. The ad called for a candidate to run against veteran Democratic Rep. Jerry Voorhis in California's 12th District.

## Defeated Voorhis

Nixon answered the ad, took on Voorhis in a series of Lincoln-Douglas style debates, and won the election. The national publicity he won on the Hiss case carried him into the Senate in 1950 after a bitter campaign against actress-politician Helen Gehagan Douglas.

Born Jan. 9, 1913, in Yerba Linda, Calif., near Los Angeles, Nixon now has his permanent home in Whittier, a Quaker colony which also is close to the movie capital. He and his attractive wife, the former Patricia Ryan, spend most of the year with their two young daughters, Patricia and Julie, in a modest home in Washington.

A graduate of Whittier College, he received a law degree from Duke University in 1937 and was practicing law in Whittier when he joined the Navy during World War II.

## Portland Jewelry Store Victim of \$20,000 Burglary

Portland — (U.P.) — Burglars seized wrist watches, rings and other jewelry valued at more than \$20,000 Saturday from Bernard's Jewelry store in downtown Portland.

Detective said the yegmen forced a basement door in the nearby Milner hotel, gained access to the Portland Beauty Academy and then forced their way into the basement of the jewelry store.

Morris Rogaway, one of the partners in the store, said an inventory would have to be taken to determine the exact loss. He said a display case containing more than 300 stone-set rings and another display case with men's wrist watches were cleaned out.

Officers called it a "well-planned job."

The jewelry robbery was the second major burglary in the Portland area in 24 hours and climaxed a series of lesser jobs over the last week, police said.

On Friday morning, burglars shattered a safe in the Shamrock Shopping center and took about \$1500. It, too, was described as a "well-planned job" because the establishment was protected by a burglar alarm system. Police said the yegs avoided it by boring a hole in the roof to gain entrance.

Another burglary was reported in the St. John's district where more than \$500 was taken from a safe in Slim's tavern.

## Three Navy Men Killed In Patrol Bomber Crash

Seattle — (U.P.) — Three men were killed and four others escaped serious injury Friday in the crash of their Navy PBV Catalina patrol bomber at the Sand Point Naval Air Station.

The aircraft was on a routine flight and crashed during landing procedures at the field.

Navy officials said names of the dead crewmen and the four survivors, all of whom were reservists on temporary duty, are being withheld pending notification of next of kin.

Exact cause of the crash will be determined by a board of inquiry.

## John Moffat To Fill Directorship Of Savings and Loan Association

John P. Moffat, manager of Mann's department store, was elected last week to fill the unexpired term of the late John C. Mann as director of the Jackson County Federal Savings and Loan association.

Moffat has been associated with Mann's department store since he came to Medford in 1914.

He was on the school board for 10 years, has been active with the Chamber of Commerce, of which he is a long time board member, and the Red Cross.

Moffat also is a vestryman at St. Mark's Episcopal church.

## TAB TRAFFIC OFFENDERS
