

Editors of Nation View Eisenhower Nomination As Victory of People

Editorial comment on the Republican National convention in Chicago and the nomination of Dwight D. Eisenhower as its presidential candidate:

The New York Times—This victory at Chicago is clearly a people's victory. General Eisenhower is the candidate whom the people chose by their own free acclaim. His nomination was the product of a great popular expression of confidence.

New York Herald Tribune—Eisenhower won. The people won. Rarely has so great an opportunity opened before Republicans. General Eisenhower comes to the leadership of the cause with gifts and experience recognized by the whole country—indeed by the whole free world.

New York Daily News—This newspaper was extremely sorry that Sen. Robert A. Taft lost the nomination. As we see it, the GOP has a tough fight on its hands to win the November election. It is Eisenhower's and his lieutenant's job to sell him to

enough voters to elect him. We hope nothing will induce them to underestimate that job. Overconfidence could slaughter Ike as it did Dewey in 1948.

Atlanta Constitution—Eisenhower's nomination assures the nation the U. S. will not withdraw into the shell advocated by the Taft, Hoover and MacArthur forces.

St. Louis Post-Dispatch—The Taft headquarters let ambition carry it so far as to assure its own defeat. Gen. Eisenhower was the beneficiary of this grievous error in the tactics of the opposition. Of the five names placed in nomination, that of Dwight David Eisenhower was easily the rank-and-file Republican favorite. Now the country will look him over in a new light to see what kind of a nominee he will make when he is tested on the issues against his as yet unnamed Democratic opponent.

St. Louis Globe-Democrat—The Republican party has chosen the best man possible for its presidential nominee. It has pointed out that misfeasances and worse of the Truman administration, and is pledged to return government to the people, to make America live again in its splendid tradition. It is in a fortuitous position to win next November.

Indianapolis Star—No Republican party could nominate a man fully satisfy all the qualities that every member would like in his presidential nominee. What is essential is that the leader of the party be in agreement with the basic tenets of Republicanism. Gen. Eisenhower has clearly demonstrated that his Republicanism is deeply rooted.

Washington Post—The first ballot nomination of General Eisenhower as the Republican candidate for president brings a resurgence of faith in our political system.

Washington Times-Herald—Gen. Eisenhower is the most extraordinary candidate who has ever received a Republican nomination. He is Mr. Truman's candidate. Gen. Eisenhower is also Gov. Dewey's candidate and therefore the candidate of the most unpopular figure in the Republican party today. The general is Wall Street's candidate and Wall Street, though it commands vast sums of money, arouses no enthusiasm for its candidates.

Chicago Sun-Times—The Sun-Times believes that Dwight D. Eisenhower should be the next president of the United States. Eisenhower of all Americans can best bring unity to this country and to the free world.

Chicago Tribune—Because people are generally disgusted with the Truman administration and because it will be difficult for the Democrats to find a can-

Abilene Thrilled by GOP Nomination of Town's Favorite Son

Abilene, Kan. — (U.P.) — Last October 2,000 persons signed a petition asking that a hometown boy, Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, be their candidate for president.

They have been working energetically ever since to boister a boomlet, which became an avalanche at the Republican National convention Friday.

Printed First Petition

Henry B. Jameson, an Abilene newspaperman who as a war correspondent had known Eisenhower in Europe, printed that first petition.

In two days, on Oct. 15-16, 1951, 2,000 of the 6,000 persons in Abilene signed. A week later the list grew to 10,000 names of persons in Dickinson county.

The plea was mailed to Eisenhower in Paris, where he was commanding United Nations forces in Europe.

Jameson's petition said:

Best Qualified

"We believe you are the best qualified man for the job of President of the United States, and we petition and urge of you to make yourself a Republican candidate for President."

Democrats and Republicans alike then wrote, wired and telephoned Jameson from all over America, he said. A woman in

California sent a dollar bill and asked how an Ike club in her home town might be organized.

Three weeks later, as Jameson said today, the boom had grown too big for little Abilene and Eisenhower - for - President headquarters moved to Topeka.

Slogan Started

A novelty dealer in Brooklyn sent six sample campaign buttons. One had a picture of Eisenhower and the words, "We want Ike."

"I like Ike," was substituted as a slogan and the Brooklyn dealer's first 2,000 buttons were pinned on lapels and blouses in Topeka an hour after they arrived.

Amateurs called in experienced politicians for advice. Sen. Henry Cabot Lodge of Massachusetts became campaign chairman.

A dozen Eisenhower clubs sprang up in Kansas the first week. Twice that many were organized in Maryland, Michigan, California and other states. In New York, a Citizens for

Eisenhower committee helped carry the ball when the Topeka-Abilene team asked for relief.

Henry Jameson — and Abilene — were not surprised at the outcome Friday at Chicago. A roaring, impromptu celebration splashed into the main streets of Abilene the minute Eisenhower won the nomination.

Hybrid Corn Acreage Reaches New Record

Washington — (U.P.) — Farmers this year planted 84.4 per cent of their corn acreage with hybrid seed, a new record, the Agriculture department said Saturday.

The department said the high-yielding hybrids were planted on five out of every six acres this year, compared to one acre in 1,000 in 1933. It said 70,366,000 of the total corn acreage of 83,369,000 acres were in hybrid.

The department said hybrid corn, which has already made a virtual sweep of the Corn Belt, is continuing to pick up popularity in other parts of the country.
