McKay Reveals Ike To Campaign Here For Fall Election

Salem—(U.P.)—Dwight Eisenhower has promised to carry his by capital hands Monday for his campaign personally to Oregon, Gov. Douglas McKay said here Monday after returning from the strenuous sessions at the Republican national convention in Chicago.

"The Eisenhower-for-Presidency was decisive, and I am looking ahead for the Republican party to regain control of the federal government at the November election," the governor said.

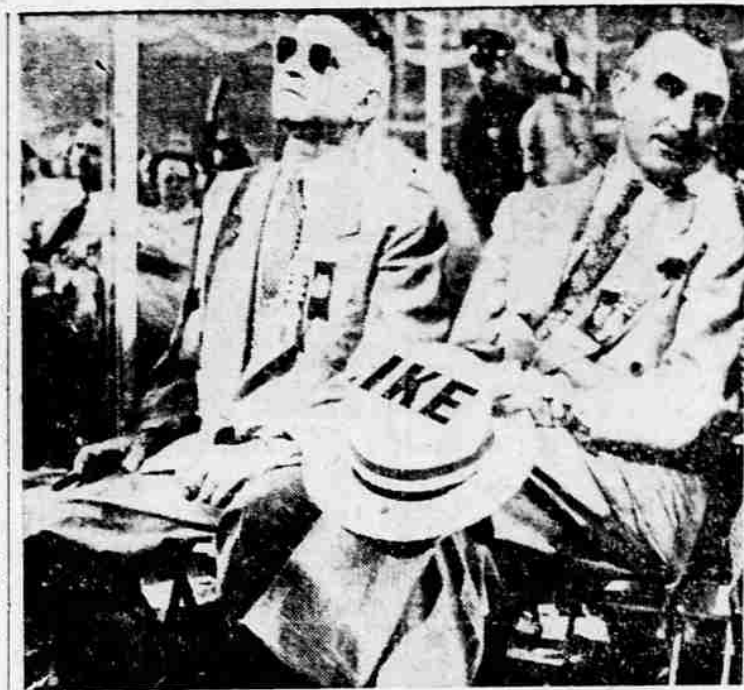
Congratulated
Gov. McKay was congratulated by capital hands Monday for his prominent part and the prominent part of the Oregon delegation, of which he was chairman, at the Chicago shindig. Gov. McKay was on several national TV and radio interviews and the Oregon delegation was prominently mentioned, for one thing because it was near the rostrum, and for another it was a key state in the Eisenhower movement, being solidly behind him with all its 18 votes.

Gov. McKay had high praise for State Sen. William E. Walsh of Coos Bay, member of the credentials committee, who spoke against seating some of the questioned Taft delegations from the South, and other Oregon delegates who spoke.

Fan And Pan Mail
The Oregon delegation received a lot of fan mail during the convention and some "pan" mail. Most writers urged Eisenhower, but one who didn't suggested, Gov. McKay said, that Oregon needs a new governor.

Gov. McKay promised, being the lifelong Republican he is: "It is my plan to do everything possible for the success of the Republican party at the November election."

Gov. McKay referred to Sen. Richard M. Nixon of California, the GOP nominee for vice president, as a fighting campaigner who would win the confidence of the voters.

"We feel that it's going to be an improvement, in that they are new cars," Hamilton said.

Foul Play Seen In Disappearance

Pasadena, Calif. — (U.P.) — The wife of an American scientist, who was engaged in secret government research, said Monday she feared he met with foul play at the hands of foreign agents.

Albert Clark Reed, who worked in secret aeronautical research at the California Institute of Technology here, disappeared from his home last Monday morning.

His wife, Florence, told officers he was to meet that day with military authorities in connection with work "so secret he couldn't even discuss it with me."

The day following the scientist's disappearance, Mrs. Reed said she received a will in the mail from San Bernardino, Calif., leaving her the family possessions.

Later, she said, she received a mysterious phone call from a woman who told her Reed was "being held for information." The woman did not identify herself.

Federal investigators in Los Angeles remained tight-lipped about the case confirming only that they had talked with Mrs. Reed.

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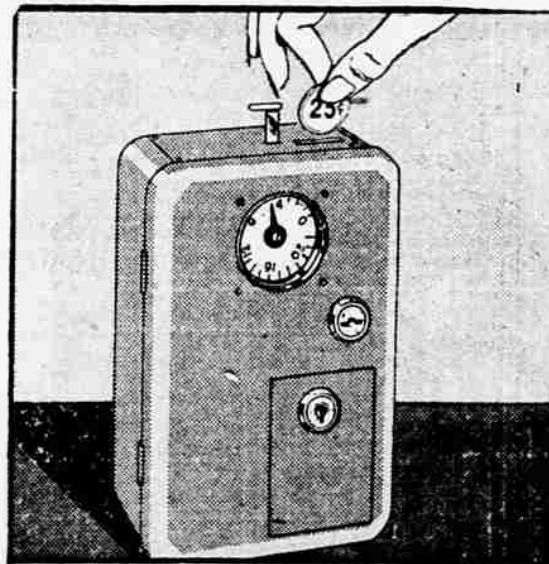
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
