State Sen. Eugene Marsh of McMinnville said, "Eisenhower's nomination assures victory for the Republican party this fall. His nomination is a result of the people's desire."

Rep. Giles French of Moro said, "I'm not at all surprised." Rep. Lee Ohmart of Salem said, "I am delighted. His nomination insures a Republican victory in November."

Denmark Planning Sale Of Second Ship to Reds

Washington — (U.P.) — Eugene Anderson, U.S. ambassador to Denmark, conferred at the state department Saturday on Danish plans to sell a second tanker to Russia.

Delivery of the first 13,000-ton ship touched off a crisis in U.S.-Danish relations recently. Countries receiving American aid are not supposed to send strategic materials behind the Iron curtain.

The administration is understood to be willing to overlook the first deal if Denmark will agree not to carry out its contract to deliver the second tanker.

Eastern Oregon Polio Epidemic Increasing

Ontario, Ore. — (U.P.) — The polio epidemic in this area continued to grow Saturday with reports of the sixth and possibly the seventh cases within two weeks.

Malheur County Health Officer, Dr. L. A. Maulding of Nyssa, Ore., said Mrs. Clarence Miller, 30, was admitted to Malheur County Memorial hospital Friday with a high temperature and partial paralysis of the left leg.

A three-year-old Ontario child may be the seventh victim, although a definite diagnosis has not been made. Symptoms reported by the child's mother are typical of polio and the physician said it is probably a very light case.

Residents of this community on the Oregon-Idaho border were warned by Dr. Maulding to avoid crowds and fatigue for the duration of the outbreak.

Another Peltier's Comet

The Harvard Observatory announcement card, dated June 23, 1952, states that "A telegram from Leslie Peltier of Delphos, Ohio, reported his discovery of a new comet." The position in the sky was given. This comet was observed the following night at the Lowell observatory in Arizona. At the time of discovery, it was of magnitude 10, considerably dimmer than could be seen without optical aid.

This discussion has to do more with the "discoverer" than with the "discovery." Leslie Peltier proved years ago that a lover of the stars did not have to be a professional astronomer in order to make important discoveries and to have his name well known over the entire scientific world. Up to 1947 Peltier had discovered 10 comets and two novae. At that time he was awarded an honorary degree of doctor of science by Bowling Green state university in Ohio in recognition of his outstanding work in astronomy over many years.

Peltier was born at Delphos, Ohio, Jan. 2, 1900, and, seemingly, has remained there ever since. He is at present listed in American Men of Science as a draftsman and cost accountant of the Delphos Bending Co. Earlier he was an automobile mechanic. He is a member of several scientific societies and has received many awards for his variable star work and comet discoveries.

US Soldiers Free To Tour in Berlin

Berlin — (U.P.) — The U.S. commandant in Berlin notified Soviet authorities Saturday night that he has no intention of restricting American soldiers to suit Russia's convenience.

Maj. Gen. Lemuel U. Mathews, rejecting a Soviet protest, advised Russian Control Commissioner S. A. Dengin that America's "traditional brand of freedom" made it impossible to prevent an occasional GI from straying into Soviet Germany.

The text of Mathew's statement was made public shortly after Russian border guards shot and seriously wounded a West Berlin truckdriver who accidentally drove a few yards into Soviet territory.

Dengin had demanded 18 days ago that U.S. officials take "measures to prevent further recurrence of incidents" involving accidental crossings of the Red German border.

US Marine Colonel Missing in Action

Washington — (U.P.) — Col. Frank H. Schwable, chief of staff of the 1st Marine aircraft wing, was listed Saturday as missing in action in Korea, his plane presumably shot down over enemy lines.

Also reported missing by Marine Corps headquarters here was Schwable's co-pilot, Maj. Roy H. Blew.

Schwable, a Naval academy graduate of 1929, is the highest ranking Marine aviator reported missing in Korean action.

Ground observers reported seeing two parachutes open after the plane was shot down by anti-aircraft fire. A night-long storm prevented aerial rescue efforts immediately. The observers also reported signal flashes from enemy territory near the burning wreckage of a plane.

Pilot's Body Removed From Old Plane Wreck

Roseburg, Ore. — (U.P.) — State Police Saturday brought out the remains of Cyrus Richard Doyle, 35, Tacoma, Wash., student pilot, who disappeared with a light plane in 1948.

Bones of Doyle and wreckage of the plane were found earlier in the Cascade mountains about 40 miles east of here by Herbert Smith, a Douglas county timber cruiser. The wreckage was located at about the 4200-

foot level. Doyle was enroute to Tacoma on a flight to Medford when he was reported missing.
