

Studs Play Davids Here Tuesday; Drain Wins Two From Medford

Medford baseball fans will see the first barnstorming team to appear here this season when the House of David nine encounters the Medford Cheney Studs on Tuesday at the fairgrounds ball park. Starting time will be 8 p. m.

The Davids, known for their beards as well as their playing ability over a period of more than 30 years, have made a large number of appearances already this season in the Northwest and reportedly have been drawing well.

Roster of the club leads off with Manager George Anderson, with the club since 1928 and ringleader of the famous pepper game with which bewhiskered gang entertains fans wherever it travels. Anderson plays second base.

Five pitchers are listed, Chas. Liska, Bon Muel, Alex Ballas, Terry Polaski and Lefty Westphal. Other members of the traveling baseball squad are Bill Brady, centerfield; Frank Williams, shortstop; Dick Drain, third base; Morley Cate, right field; Chuck Chapetta, left field; Bob Mitchell, first base, and Ray Chew, catcher.

The baseball club, organized in 1914 by the Israelite House of David colony of Benton Harbor, Mich., started making extensive road trips in 1919. With exception of the war years 1942 and through 1945, they have had a team on the road each year since 1919.

The Davids have tried to maintain a strong and hustling club and as a result have built up a large following wherever they have been. During the past four seasons the club has played to more than 750,000 paying spectators.

It is every day a different town for the bearded athletes. Strange faces and new wisecracks are the Davids' daily diet and they love it.

Marty Hume, new addition to the Studs' pitching staff is expected to see mound duty on Tuesday.

The Studs have another date with a traveling club this Friday. They battle with the Havana Cubans at the fairgrounds here.

MEDFORD SKIDS
Drain was more firmly entrenched in first place and Medford skidded into a three way knot for third position as the result of Southwestern Oregon Baseball league activity during the week-end. Cross Bay-North Bend got sole hold on second spot.

The Medford Cheney Studs lost twice to Drain, 11 to 2 on Saturday and 4 to 3 on Sunday. Roseburg and Coquille divided, Coquille taking one game 11 to 1 and Roseburg the other 10 to 2. Coose Bay divided with Bandon, winning one fray 5 to 2 but dropping the other 5 to 4.

Six errors that helped Drain to eight runs in the second inning had the most to do with the Studs downfall on Saturday. Medford got its only runs in the fourth stanza on hits by Alex McDonald, Snuffy Smith, Moose Blevins and Pete Bianchi and a fielder's choice by Frank Roelandt.

Sunday's game was a humdinger with Medford taking a 1 to 0 score in the fifth inning, Medford going ahead 2 to 1 in the seventh inning and the Black Sox coming back to get a 3 to 2 advantage in the sixth. Medford knotted the game in the eighth.

In the ninth Don Kirsch singled and advanced on an error and a walk and Harvey Storey drove him home with none away for the Sox' game-winning run.

For Medford's fourth inning run, McDonald doubled but was out on Roelandt's fielders choice, Jack Gordon singled and Roelandt scored on an error. In the seventh Smith singled, Bianchi singled and Tom O'Donnell hit a long fly which allows Smith to score.

Helsinki — (U.P.) — Fearless Fraley's facts and figures:

Paavo Nurmi, the Flying Finn of a quarter century ago, isn't as fast as he was when he won five Olympic medals, but he's doing much better financially. His haberdashery store is a mecca for visiting Olympic athletes who go there to see the great track star and stay to buy expensive shirts and neckties. Nurmi is a grumpy man who rarely smiles, says but little and sends the customers away feeling cheated by their visit. . . .

Hoop Bug Bites
South African athletes . . . that their country has been bitten by the basketball bug. In Durban, for instance, the game was introduced two years ago by a Mormon missionary. They now have 19 teams in two leagues which play in fire houses, over garages, etc. . . . Dr. Forrest Phog Allen of Kansas, co-coach of the U.S. Olympic team, points out that this parallels the growth of the game in the United States where it was invented. The U.S. track and field squad was completed with the arrival

of Fred Will and Horace Ashenfelder. They were delayed because of other boys running — both being FBI agents.

Course Not Tough
According to America's three marathon hopefuls, the Olympic hill — and — dare course isn't as tough as that over which the Boston marathon is run. The trio, Vic Drygall of Fort Lee, N.J., Tom Jones of Philadelphia and Ted Corbett of New York, explained that the first seven miles is virtually level and the last part is over only slightly rolling terrain. . . . which makes that 26-mile, 385-yard event a mere jaunt, huh? . . .

The Finns are friendly people but very few speak English and further complicating matters for visitors is a bus strike which has put Helsinki taxicabs at high premium. . . . Prices on the whole are not much lower than in the United States.

May Be Weakened
John Davis of Brooklyn, the world champion weight lifter who is favored to capture the Olympic heavyweight title, may not be in top strength. He has been suffering from dysentery. . . . Experts contend that at top strength he probably could break the Olympic record by more than 100 pounds in three lifts if he had larger hands.

Jim Fuchs, the former Yale star who holds the world's shot-putting record, injured his right hand to go with a taped ankle and a left knee from which the cartilage has been removed. But Coach Brutus Hamilton isn't worried, contending that "Fuchs is better when he has something wrong with him."
